Dear Parishioners,

We are in this exciting time of the church from Easter to Pentecost as we have invited our newest members into the community at the Easter Vigil through Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion. The wisdom of the church teaches us how to instruct these newest members through the Rites of Christian Initiation. There is something that many Catholics, I find, are unaware of—that we do not actually teach sacraments to those who have been in formation through RCIA until after Easter. We prepare them to receive the sacraments in faith and then, after that, for their instruction we help them unpack the experience of the sacraments. If you go to the church's Liturgy of the Hours in the Office of the Readings, you will see that the reflections do just that. They are instructions from the earliest days on Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist. This past Sunday during RCIA class, I unpacked with those who had recently been baptized. I asked them what happened in the waters. They could witness an experience of new birth, and walking a new life in Christ were just some of what they said. I then took them to the Office of the Readings for the day and a homily that St Augustine had written to the newest members, and almost word for word what Augustine had said had been their experience of baptism. These newest members challenge us to renew and to see our faith and our receiving of the sacraments in a new way as a church from Easter to Pentecost. We are renewed, thanks to our newest members, in our youthfulness as a church; no matter what age we are, may we continue to rekindle the flame of faith in this Easter season.

Simple Acts to Save Our Planet

With Earth Day fast approaching on April 22nd, our thoughts turn to caring for our planet. Some excerpts from *Simple Acts to Save Our Planet—500 Ways to Make a Difference* by Michelle Neff:

- Reuse old socks or T-shirts for cleaning. Instead of throwing them out, **reuse old clothes** for car cleaning or even general cleaning around the house.
- Keep your fridge free of frost. A buildup of frost and ice only drives up your **energy use**. Check your freezer occasionally to see if there is unnecessary frost.
- Don't put hot food in the fridge. Putting hot food in the fridge makes the fridge work overtime trying to cool it down. Let it cool to **room temperature** before putting the food in the fridge.
- Use natural gas instead of charcoal for grilling. Charcoal produces tiny particles that pollute the air. By using propane or natural gas instead of charcoal, you won't be contributing to air pollution. Better yet, use an **electric grill** that is powered by the sun or wind and you'll really be grilling green!

WV Severe Flooding Relief Efforts

Efforts continue across the Mountain State after the severe flooding that occurred earlier this month. West Virginia encountered tornados, microbursts, strong winds, heavy rains, and mudslides. Several counties have experienced moderate to substantial flooding, notably along the Ohio River and its tributaries. The National Weather Service has confirmed 5 tornadoes in West Virginia – Huntington (Cabell/Wayne), St, Albans (Kanawha), Cross Lanes (Kanawha), Quick (Kanawha) and Lavista (Fayette). A State of Emergency has been declared in 17 West Virginia Counties.

Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved **a special collection to be held the weekend of April 20-21, 2024**, in all parishes and missions throughout the diocese to support recovery efforts related to the series of disasters that have occurred. Checks should be made out to St. Agnes with "Disaster Relief" on the memo line.

Donations can also be made on the diocesan website at <https://dwc.org/disaster-relief/>. Proceeds from this collection will support the long-term humanitarian and recovery efforts of Catholic Charities West Virginia. Their offices assist families long after other organizations have moved out. The role of Catholic Charities will last months and years as they help families and individuals in the rebuilding process to restore safe, secure, and sanitary living conditions. All of the money raised will stay in West Virginia to assist our neighbors.

Please remember in prayer all those whose lives have been changed in the wake of these disasters. Let us come together now to support our brothers and sisters in Christ who have been injured and lost their homes, cars, employment, and access to food and water.

Racial Justice Initiative

A reminder to all. Here at St. Agnes we keep adding to our Racial Justice Library in the church narthex, where you will find many contemporary books related to the quest for racial justice that our faith calls us to serve.

The latest addition is James McBride's, "The Color of Water." This is the award winning author's first of his many books. It is, as a Black man, a tribute to his white Jewish mother. It is a telling story of a woman and her family facing the challenges of American white supremacy and racism over a lifetime. His mother grew up in a small Jewish community (with her father the Rabbi) in Suffolk, Virginia; moved to New York city; married a Black man; was disowned by her family; founded a Christian Church with her husband, serving the all-black, Red Hook housing projects in Brooklyn, New York, where the family lived; and managed to send all of her 12 children to college. It is an unvarnished story, well told, with insight, compassion, and without bitterness, in spite of what the family faced. Check out this true story with a great message.

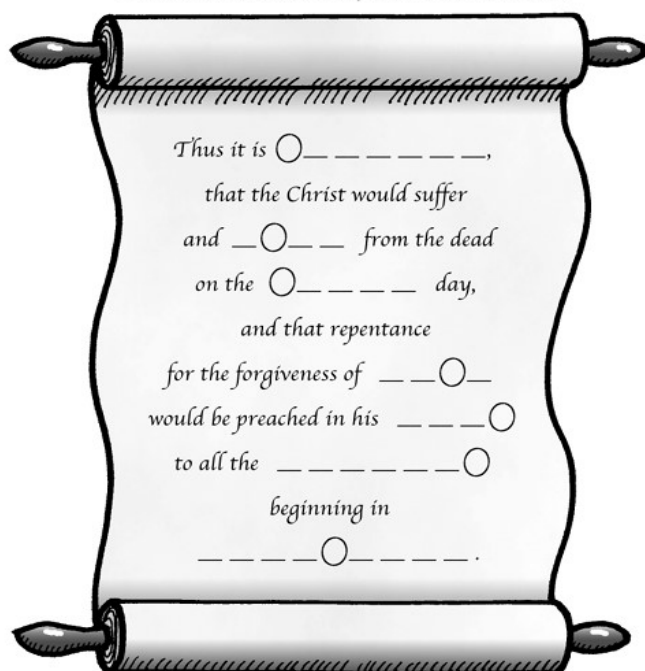

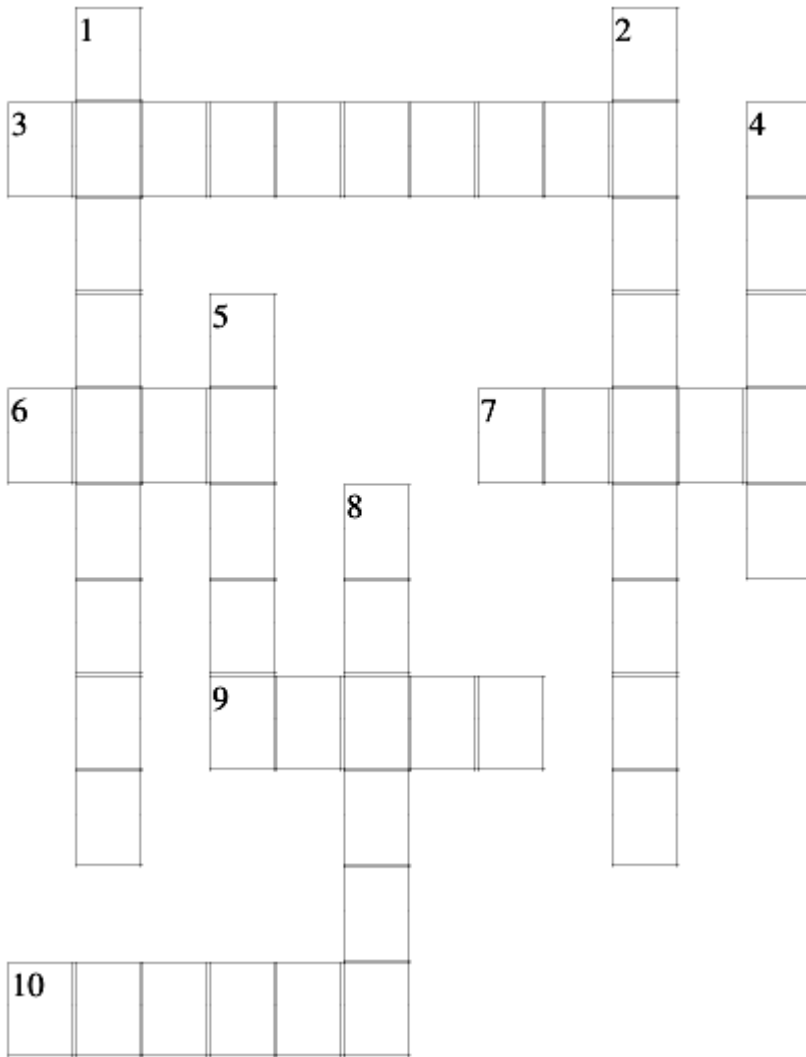

Volunteering: The church is always looking for volunteers. It is our way to demonstrate our faith in action! All volunteers are required to be VIRTUS trained as required by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston.

If you would like to volunteer for any parish ministry including with our youth, you must be VIRTUS trained. Forms are located in the church narthex and the parish center on how to complete this process. All parents are encouraged to be VIRTUS trained.

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Luke 24:35-48

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus appears to the disciples and invites them to touch him to see that he is really alive. He calls the disciples to be his witnesses. They have Good News to tell—that love is stronger than death, victory can come from suffering, and life can come from death.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child learned that Jesus visited his friends on that first Easter and gave them the gift of his peace. The class also learned about the importance of being peacemakers. Discuss how your family members can be signs of peace to one another and the importance of offering the Sign of Peace to others at Mass. There may be a place to prominently display your child's peace banner made during the lesson.

Good News (Grades 2-3): This Sunday's Gospel tells us that Jesus is alive and is still with us. Your child also learned how stories help us remember those we love even if they have died. Ask your child to tell the story titled, "Remembering Buddy." Share the ways your family shows faith that Jesus lives in you and that you will live forever with him. Talk with your child about what the Real Presence is. The class studied the Real Presence as a Catholic Faith Word this week.

Venture (Grades 4-6): This Sunday's Gospel recounts how two disciples recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread. Your youngster explored how we celebrate Jesus in the breaking of the bread at Mass. The class also learned how missionaries carried the Good News of the Gospel throughout the world. Discuss how important the celebration of Mass is for your family. Share ways in which your family can spread the message of the Risen Jesus to everyone you meet. Study the missionary map together.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Part of this week's lesson showed how Saint Paul journeyed to spread the Good News from Jerusalem to Rome. The class also learned that during the Eucharistic Prayer at Mass, we remember the events of salvation, we celebrate a sacred meal, we ask for God's help, and we express our hope for the future. Talk together about your family's hopes and dreams for the future. Discuss why being faithful members of the Church should be an important part of that future. Have your young person tell the family about Cassie Chawke.

Pray Together

Eastern Christians have a special way of greeting one another during Easter. One person says, "Christ is risen!" and the other answers, "Truly, he is risen!" or "Indeed, he is risen!" Use this greeting with members of the family throughout this week.

EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
