Diocese Interim Stage Synod Report

Tasked with engaging in a synodal process here in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, local synodal sessions were modeled on the process used at the World Synod in Rome. Sessions were held in each of our six vicariates/ deaneries/regions. Members of Diocesan staff served as facilitators for these synodal listening sessions.

In preparing the report, the Diocese conducted six listening sessions—one in each vicariate. While covering a wide range of topics, the listening sessions focused on two main questions that were provided by the USCCB.

The notes from each meeting were collected and given to the synod writing team, which consisted of three lay people who are not employed by the Diocese. The format for the report, as requested by the USCCB, includes a large majority of quotations; taken from the notes provided during the listening sessions.

Dear Parishioners,

Before my ordination, the parish that I attended growing up put an invitation in the bulletin that Andy Switzer on June 4th would be joining the Order of Presbyters. The pastor told me that a parishioner that knew me well had said, "What happened? I thought Andy was going to be a priest?" The pastor was wise and had a teachable moment; "presbyter" was one of the earliest titles for church leadership. I recall Raymond Brown's Scripture Scholars' book, The Church the Apostles Left Behind, and in that book he points out that it did not take long for the early Jesus movement to recognize that they needed to establish structural leadership in order to continue to carry out their mission. Brown, who was a brilliant scripture scholar on the gospel of John, affirmed the many gifts of this gospel, known as the community of the beloved disciple. Brown pointed out that its strength was its recognition of the gift of the Holy Spirit; its weakness, that brought a lot of problems, was its weak structural leadership. This is where the word "presbyter" comes from. It is the call of leadership that provides oversight and is also one of service. The truth is, 12 years ago on the day my ordination, I had a whole lot to learn about what this meant, and the people in parish life over the years have been my best teachers; this is what Pope Francis calls synodality. An insight from Vatican II is that ministerial priesthood (presbyter) is at the service of the baptized priesthood. The purpose of it is to provide the oversight so that all of the gifts of the local community, the body of Christ, may flourish to carry out our mission. This means that as St. Agnes we have many different groups, committees, forms of leadership, but the role of presbyter is to help us see how all of those fit together. Paul in First Corinthians uses the image of a body in many parts and each of the parts are part of the whole. Pope Francis calls us to see the sum is greater than the parts. This should be encouraging to all of us; we do not have to do everything, but rather, as the different parts of the body we learn to rely on each other, so that as a whole we are able to carry out the mission.

WV Severe Flooding Relief Efforts

Efforts continue across the Mountain State after the severe flooding that occurred earlier this month. West Virginia encountered tornados, microbursts, strong winds, heavy rains, and mudslides. Several counties have experienced moderate to substantial flooding, notably along the Ohio River and its tributaries. The National Weather Service has confirmed 5 tornadoes in West Virginia – Huntington (Cabell/Wayne), St. Albans (Kanawha), Cross Lanes (Kanawha), Quick (Kanawha) and Lavista (Fayette). A State of Emergency has been declared in 17 West Virginia Counties.

Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved a special collection to be held the weekend of April 20-21, 2024, in all parishes and missions throughout the diocese to support recovery efforts related to the series of disasters that have occurred. Checks should be made out to St. Agnes with "Disaster Relief" on the memo line.

Donations can also be made on the diocesan website at https://dwc.org/disaster-relief/. Proceeds from this collection will support the long-term humanitarian and recovery efforts of Catholic Charities West Virginia. Their offices assist families long after other organizations have moved out. The role of Catholic Charities will last months and years as they help families and individuals in the rebuilding process to restore safe, secure, and sanitary living conditions. All of the money raised will stay in West Virginia to assist our neighbors.

Racial Justice Initiative

Nearly a century before African slaves set foot in Jamestown in 1619 on the land that was to become the future United States of America, other African slaves had in fact already done so in 1526 on land near the present day boundary of Georgia and North Carolina. These slaves, some 100 in number, had arrived as part of a Spanish group of settlers in an expedition led by Lucas Vasquez de Ayllon. The settlement, known as San Miguel de Gualdape, only lasted a couple of months due to the shortage of food and the ravages of disease. Only 150 of the original 600 in the settlement group survived to sail back to Spain. But others chose to stay - the surviving African slaves. Shortly before the Spanish set sail for home, the slaves rebelled and disappeared inland. It thus marks the little known fact that this was the first African slave revolt in our nation and that these Africans could be considered the first non-Indigenous people to settle here, if not entirely by choice. It is also perhaps somewhat ironic that this place was also where the first Catholic Mass was celebrated in what would become the USA. Some of the expedition members were two Dominican

There is some food for thought here as to what role, we as Catholics, have played and wish to play in our pursuit of racial justice in America.





The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: John 10:11-18

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus compares himself to a good shepherd who knows and cares for his sheep. This image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is one of the oldest images of Jesus in Christian art. The Good Shepherd cares for the world and demonstrates how everyone can care for the earth and its people.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child learned about Jesus the Good Shepherd. They also learned to recognize people in their lives who care for them like shepherds. Talk about the ways your family cares for other people and how your child can learn more about care by watching over any pets you may have. Be sure to display the Good Shepherd project your child made in class.

Good News (Grades 2-3): While learning about Jesus the Good Shepherd, your child's class also learned how to care for the great gift of Creation. Talk together about ways your family is already caring for the earth and its resources. Talk, too, about ways you can do even better. Invite your child to teach your family the "We Care for Creation" game. Also discuss what a parish is and who leads the parish starting with the pastor.










Maya Lin's "What is Missing?"

"Together we can save two birds with one tree."

This is how artist Maya Lin recasts the conventional phrase of killing two birds with one stone to make it generative rather than destructive, as honoring rather than harming nature. It is also a kind of motto for her project "What is Missing?"

Lin is well known for memorializing important events in American life-the Vietnam War, the Civil Rights Movement among them. What Is Missing? memorializes the effects of climate change. She asks us to look at a memorial not as a singular, static object, but as a work that can exist in multiple forms and places around the world. The memorial includes permanent sound and media sculptures, traveling exhibits, temporary installations, and this website - serving as the nexus for the entire project. "What Is Missing?" as described on the website is "a multi-sited memorial created by Maya Lin to raise awareness through science-based artworks about the present sixth mass extinction of species, connect this loss of species to habitat degradation and loss, and emphasize that by protecting and restoring habitat, we can both reduce carbon emissions and protect species. Loss is merely the departure point. What Is Missing? is equally focused on solutions - imagining plausible visions for a sustainable future, showcasing what is being done around the world to help, and utilizing art to pose new ways of looking at the problems we face – giving us hope that each of us can make a difference."

The site offers a detailed description of its purpose when you click on "About." Additional categories include "Explore," which guides us in discovering ecological histories and stories of former abundance and loss and recovery on a "map of memory." "Solutions," shows us how we can reduce emissions and protect and restore species and habitats. "What If," invites us to consider how art can help us rethink the problems we face and give us hope that we can make a difference. And "Share Your Memory," is a place to share your memory of places close to home, building a global memorial of stories of the natural world.

Child Abuse Prevention Month

Did you know...The Catholic Church is deeply committed to protecting children from abuse and holding people accountable for inflicting such pain. In December 2021, the revised Book VI of the Code of Canon Law went into effect. This is the most recent of several documents that specifically address the issue of the abuse of children. Other documents include Vos estis lux mundi and Vademecum. These documents expand the acts which are considered abusive, clarify the manner in which the cases are processed, and hold people accountable for their action or inaction with regard to processing of a case. Of significant importance is attention given to the care of victim survivors and all who have been harmed. Bishops in the US lead the way for these changes with the implementation of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People 20 years ago. Today every diocese and eparchy must have in place systems for tending to those who have been harmed, protecting those in our care and seeking restorative justice.

Dennis Schuelkens, Jr., V.E., ext. 270. You may also call the Diocese's Office of Safe Environment at 304.230.1504. In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious, or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.


