Intergenerational Community Garden

This year we are trying a different approach to our gardening endeavors here at St Agnes--intergenerational teams managing specific vegetable, herbs, and flower beds. Our hope is to share our harvest with Shepherdstown Shares and also to use these fresh ingredients for our meals for the hungry.



The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 20:1–9 and John 20:19-31

This week's Gospel at Home covers two Sundays. The Gospel for Easter tells of Mary of Magdalene's visit to the tomb and her discovery that Jesus was not there. The Gospel for the following Sunday describes Jesus' appearance to his disciples, his greeting of peace, and his gift of the Holy Spirit.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Easter celebrates new life. Children see new life in growing things in nature. Your child this week learned that Jesus is risen on Easter. Sometime during these two weeks take a walk in a park or in the country. Look for signs of new life and talk with your child about the gift of life.

Promise (Grades K-1): In class, your child made two story strips that tell the Gospel stories from Easter and the 2nd Sunday of Easter. Ask them to share the stories with the family and talk about the joy Mary Magdalene and the followers of Jesus had when they found Jesus was alive. How can your family share Easter joy with others?

Good News (Grades 2–3): Ask your child to tell you what Mary Magdalene found when she went to Jesus' tomb. Share the story of Jesus' visit to his followers. Follow the instructions in the last page of the Good News booklet to make an Easter candle for your family. Light your candle—with fire or your imagination—each evening during the season of Easter, and say or sing with your family: "Alleluia."

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your son or daughter experienced an Easter Vigil prayer and dramatized the Gospels for both Easter Sunday and the 2nd Sunday of Easter. The class also learned about the conversion of Saint Paul and about the early witnesses to the Resurrection and how those witnesses spread the Good News. If your family attended the Easter Vigil, talk about your favorite parts of the Mass. Say the prayer on the cover of this week's lesson book together and light a candle to signify the start of the Easter season. Talk about ways your family witnesses to Jesus' Resurrection.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Both Sunday Gospels that are a part of this lesson taught your young person that Easter faith makes all things new. Part of that Easter faith is the call to be witnesses to Jesus' Resurrection. For the people in the Gospel stories, the great sorrow of their loss was turned to great joy when they realized that Jesus had been raised from the dead. Talk about losses your family has experienced. What did you feel? What did you do? Ask your son or daughter to share how he or she felt while reading the story about Toby. Commit as a family to take time to enjoy one another's company during the days of Easter.

Pray Together

One of the important parts of the Easter Vigil service is the celebration of Baptism and the renewal of your own baptismal promises. If you still have your family's baptismal candles and certificates, display them during the first two weeks of Easter. Say your morning or evening prayer in front of the display and renew your own baptismal yows.



St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

In the Easter Sunday morning reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Colossians, we are told that as Christians, if we have died with Christ, we have also been raised with Christ and thus now "your life is hidden with Christ in God." For Black Christians this truth about the resurrection of Jesus means that in spite of their intrinsic worth as children of God often being unacknowledged, hidden, so to speak, they will ultimately be fully seen and "will be revealed with him in glory."

Black Christian slaves in America often held faith gatherings in secluded places, where they could freely and joyfully celebrate their true selves as "hidden with Christ in God." Even though they may have been seen by many in the white world as sub-human, counted as only threefifths of a person in the U.S. census, if their white world did not "see" them, they celebrated the Jesus who did. Like Mary Magdalene in the Easter morning Gospel story, they believed Jesus truly saw them and called each of them by name. Having so identified with Jesus in his Passion as one unjustly "lynched" by the authorities, they experienced a unique, vibrant joy in celebrating Easter. Many Black Churches have historically made Easter the day they celebrate with a host of celebrations, from meals, traditional Easter pageants by children, exuberant, music filled liturgies, to the wearing of their finest clothes - an unabashed, unapologetic celebration of their selves "hidden with Christ in God."

Some have commented how white Christians seem to know better how to celebrate Lent than they do Easter. Black Christians may have something unique to share with us all.
