

Dear Parishioners.

This Friday we celebrated the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. There is a tendency on this feast day to put an emphasis on original sin. I find in the reading and symbols a more attractive direction is the surprising way God calls us in our ordinary life. The Genesis story that asks Adam and Eve, "where are you?" I believe is the foundational principle of the whole spiritual life. We have a tendency, out of fear, to run from the gift of our self or hide our truest self. Yet our loving God wants us to gently accept ourselves and see what possibilities for our future there are when we begin to see ourself as a gift along with all of creation. In the gospel on this feast, as Mary faces new surprises and possibilities about herself, her first reaction is fear. The angel Gabriel comes to her to reveal to her that what looks like a problem or a danger is a gift. There is a new birth and call that is opening on her journey. The God of surprises with her yes is opening possibilities and a new beginning for all of humanity. Perhaps Advent is a season for us to see ourselves in the characters and symbols; the God of love to meet us just where we are at, and, even in the fears we hold ourselves or for our world, to allow the Angel Gabriel's message of "Do not be afraid" to follow the gift coming to birth in us. I offer this poem that I shared in the homily the first Sunday of Advent. May we see our journey and call in the symbols and stories of this season. May it stretch our imagination to follow the God of surprises.

> To stay or to go the advent story has its uncertainty. Dead of winter is Unexpectedly pregnant Advent annunciation An inevitable apocalypse Quietly divorce her or follow the star. Return to the King Or flee and follow a dream. Pregnancy, Nativity Epiphany Advent candlelight And winter's unpredictability Awaits the Christmas mystery.

What is the Purpose of VIRTUS Training and Why Is It Important?

The Diocese of Wheeling Charleston is requiring all volunteers to be VIRTUS trained. This is part of the Diocese's Safe Environment policy that St. Agnes is required to follow. All volunteers must be Virtus trained, even those who are not involved with the youth. We must be in compliance by the end of 2023. If you volunteer in any capacity at St Agnes, you must be Virtus trained.

VIRTUS training is designed to help adults recognize the signs that indicate a child might be suffering abuse. It also helps adults by offering key points to help children, who might confide in them, deal with potential situations. Finally, it helps adults know who to contact and what the next steps are if they suspect or discover a child is being abused. All this training is designed to help adults help children through a difficult situation.

The grand total raised is \$3,777! Someone had a very clever bidding strategy. No reveals but others may try to figure it out. The winners will have a memorable dinner, and our Kolofata girls are the true beneficiaries. Thanks to the winners and non-winners who made this so successful.

One of Our Core Outreach Ministries Needs Our Help!

One of our most important outreach ministries that addresses a huge need in our County has been our provision of meals to the homeless and hungry three Wednesday evenings a month at one of the Charles Town churches. We have been one of a large number of churches and community groups who have worked together to sustain this 365 day a year ministry for over 10 years. Countless parishioners through the years have prepared, delivered and served meals and/or donated funds to cover meal costs. This is one of the most important— and popular—ongoing ministries of our youth who for years have prepared one meal a month.

We have a funding shortfall this year—and into the future without your help. A full explanation follows. Here's the short version: If 30 people give \$5 a month, and 20 people give \$10 a month, and 10 people give \$25 a month, we will cover our yearly expenses!

Originally meals were served in a church building. On average at the start folks would prepare enough for 25 people—but always more the last Wednesday of the month. By then folks usually have exhausted their SNAP benefits, if they are eligible, or other funds so the numbers of people seeking a warm meal usually increases around 20%. As numbers of people seeking a meal increased and food costs rose, we started providing cash cards to our chefs, purchased through St. Agnes, to help underwrite their costs. We started at \$25, then \$50 and by the time of Covid we were providing \$100 to \$150 depending on time of month.

In order to fund the cash cards, we asked for donations at our monthly Social Concerns (now Service, Justice and Peace, SJP) weekends. We also received online donations and periodic contributions. Gradually through the years we built up a generous surplus which got us through donation dry spells.

Then came Covid. Meal delivery didn't stop — it just changed. Food was now prepared in carry-out containers and handed out to people outside the church doors. This method became so popular it continues to this day. And the numbers of people coming for a hot meal started to climb. First to forty, then fifty, now regularly sixty people come, and one evening seventy!

Food costs too have increased. We were able to continue to provide cash cards and increased the regular amount given to chefs to \$150. Now with the increasing meal counts we believe we want to increase the amount we give our parish chefs to \$175. After an initial drop of financial support from parishioners in 2020, donations picked up again in 2021, but then donations dropped by 50% in 2022, and by another 20% in 2023. We barely broke even in 2022 and we are deficit spending in 2023 at a time when the need is growing. Of the first eleven months of 2023, we deficit spent in four months – and we know there will be great need in December and beyond for food.

We are asking an enormous commitment from our parishioner chefs, including our youth, and we need more volunteers **especially** to help transport the food to the distribution point and give out the meals to folks. And we desperately need **ONGOING** contributions to this ministry. There are lots of ways to donate—at our monthly SJP weekends, by a check in the collection basket or sent to the Parish Office with HOMELESS on the memo line, or by online giving.



The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 1:1-8

In Sunday's Gospel, John the Baptist urges people to prepare a smooth, straight road on which God can come to us. Isaiah's words of comfort to the exiled Israelites assure them and us that we can count on God's forgiveness. Jesus' words call for us to turn our lives around and make sure that we have an open path for God to enter our hearts. Note: Tuesday is the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, another chance to celebrate Mary, our Mother.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child is very aware of growth and change in his or her own body—and is growing as a Christian too. Be sure to praise your child for the ways he or she shares with others. Ask your child to tell you the story of Our Lady of Guadalupe and share with you the little booklet he or she made in class.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week, your child learned the words of John the Baptist, who told people to prepare for the coming of the Lord. Talk about the ways your family is preparing for Christmas. Are you thinking and praying about the birth of Jesus, or are you thinking about toys and gifts? Ask your child to tell the family the story of "A Boy Named John" from this week's lesson. Add the Prayer to the Holy Spirit in family prayers this week.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week, your young person prepared for the Christmas feast by learning about the prophet Isaiah and John the Baptist, two biblical characters who preceded Jesus. Your son or daughter also learned the importance of forgiving and seeking forgiveness as part of making a straight path for the Lord's arrival. Make sure your young person understands how sin separates us from God. Ask your youngster to share the story of Saint Jane Frances de Chantal with you.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Gift-giving has long been a part of the Christmas celebration. In class, your teen explored his or her own attitudes about giving presents at Christmas. He or she also explored how to give of him- or herself in the gifts that he or she gives. Talk about the way your family approaches giving gifts at Christmastime. Think of ways you can give of yourself to the people you give presents. Consider having your family enact the Our Lady of Guadalupe play included in this week's lesson.

Pray Together

To celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe (December 12), add praying the Hail Mary to your Advent wreath prayer this week. You may even want to place a statue or picture of Mary near your wreath.



Universal Declaration of Human Rights Turns 75

10 December 2023 marks the 75th anniversary of one of the world's most groundbreaking global pledges: the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u> (UDHR). This landmark document enshrines the inalienable rights that everyone is entitled to as a human being - regardless of race, colour, religion, sex, language, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status.

The Declaration was proclaimed by the United Nations General Assembly in Paris on 10 December 1948 and sets out, for the first time, fundamental human rights to be universally protected.

Available in more than 500 languages, it is the most translated document in the world. A year-long initiative focusing on universality, progress and engagement, will culminate in a high-level event in December 2023, which will announce global pledges and ideas for a vision for the future of human rights.

Spotlight on Ministry

Hundreds of scientists from universities, industry and federal agencies contributed to the National Climate Assessment released last month. There's bad news and good news.

In the decade of the 1980's the US averaged 3.3 severe weather events (defined as freezes, winter storms, wildfires, droughts, flooding, hurricanes and severe storms) per year. By the 1990's that had increased to 5.7 per year. In the first 10 years of the 21st century we averaged 6.7 and in the last 3 years, the US has averaged 20 such weather events per year. These cost us all in dollars, decreased quality of environment and health and in deaths to humans, animals, plants and waterways. These events have an even greater impact on our brothers and sisters in poorer countries where access to resources and money to recover, rebuild and replant are far less than in our own country.

The good news is that we can make a difference. There are dozens of suggestions that reduce greenhouse gases which lead to severe weather events. Even going back to the Catholic practice of not eating meat on Fridays year round can have a measurable impact as animals we eat produce greenhouse gases at a much higher rate than growing vegetables, grains and legumes.

EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.

IRA Charitable Gifts

A gift through your IRA is a great way to support St Agnes. Here is some information on how you can maximize your giving in 2023: IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

- Donors age 70½ or older may make a gift of any amount, up to \$100,000 per individual (\$200,000 for couples with individual IRA accounts), from your IRA without paying income tax on the donated amount.
- For donors who have a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), making a gift directly from your IRA to St. Agnes can be counted toward satisfying your RMD for the year, as long as certain rules are met.
- In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.
- QCDs don't require that you itemize, which due to the recent tax law changes, means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving.
- Funds should be transferred directly from the donor's financial institution to St. Agnes.
