
Saint Agnes

Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday

This, the 3rd Sunday of Advent, is Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday, and we light the rose colored candle. Prior to Vatican II, the Advent Season was heavily penitential in character and that lifted at the midpoint. The Second Vatican Council placed the focus on prayerful expectation of both the second coming of Christ and subsequently, after Gaudete Sunday, on the celebration of the Incarnation, the coming of the Son of God for the first time. Therefore, on Gaudete Sunday we anticipate the joy that awaits us in the Christmas Season.

Adult Faith Formation Courses

Two five-week courses are being offered through the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation (VLCFF) in the first part of 2023. These courses are hybrid models. They are composed of both weekly live two-hour zoom lectures as well as a rich variety of online course materials and discussion experiences through the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community For Faith Formation (VLCFF). The courses are being underwritten by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's Office of Evangelization & Catechesis, who pays 100% of the tuition and the cost of any books associated with the courses. Survey of Catholic Doctrine

January 9th - February 12th, 2023

Have you ever wanted to explore your faith more deeply and understand more clearly the Trinity, Jesus as God's self revealed, the Holy Spirit and much more? We will study some of the major doctrines of the Catholic Church through the five week hybrid course Survey of Catholic Doctrine, a course sponsored through the Diocese of Wheeling Charleston and the University of Dayton Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation, it will run from January 9th to February 12th. There are no prerequisites, just bring your questions and a desire to learn about your faith. This course combines Zoom lectures/discussions once a week on Wednesday evenings from 7-9pm led by Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu with materials available online through the VLCFF website and meets the course requirement for catechetical certification for the diocese. New Testament

January 9th-February 12th, 2023

This course builds on the material learned in Introduction to Scripture and assumes a basic understanding of how Catholics read and interpret Scripture. We will explore the world behind the text of the New Testament, its history and culture, as well as examine how we today read and understand these texts in light of our own world and culture. We will look at how all four Gospels developed, study the letters of Paul, and examine the world of first century Christianity. This is a five-week hybrid course offered through the Diocese and the Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation of the University of Dayton. You will be able to work online taking guizzes and accessing material, as well as meet once a week via Zoom for class lecture and discussion with the course facilitator, Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu. The Zoom sessions will be held on Tuesday evenings at 7pm (a second session on Monday afternoon may be added if the response is large enough). St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

For Blacks enslaved in our country, the Advent/Christmas season had a unique significance. In addition to the season being a joyous celebration of their intrinsic, spiritual freedom as children of God and inheritors of His Kingdom, it also represented a prime time for a possible escape to freedom from their actual, physical human bondage.

Masters usually gave those they enslaved a few days off from work at Christmastime to party and celebrate, not only as a holiday "gift", but also as a safety valve to enable their enslaved to "blow off steam" and dampen any desire to flee. Passes to visit relatives were given to the enslaved to visit family members on nearby plantations, enabling them to travel the roads without being detained as an escapee. If the enslaved person took off for freedom at that time, masters would not know they had till they failed to return to work after the break. The masters and overseers themselves were usually celebrating the holiday, with liquor etc. and less likely to be paying close attention. Consequently, Christmas was a prime opportunity to escape to freedom. Harriet Tubman herself successfully led three of her brothers to freedom on Christmas Eve of 1854.

It is not surprising that the Star of Bethlehem that led the Wise Men became merged as a symbol with the North Star that literally led escapees to their freedom in the North.

Christmas was indeed a celebration of freedom, of the birth of Jesus who came to liberate the poor and oppressed.







December 11, 2022 3rd Sunday of Advent

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11

In Advent, we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus, who is truly human and truly God. Healing actions prophesied by Isaiah—making the blind see, the deaf hear, and the lame leap, as well as preaching the Good News to the poor—all tell John the Baptist who Jesus is. Jesus' loving actions continued to be completed by his followers today. Jesus calls us to be just and loving as he is, especially by helping people unable to help themselves. All the readings for this Sunday recall the themes of reconciliation and wholeness.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child's class discussed Mary and Joseph's long journey to Bethlehem. Ask them to tell your family about the different characters in the story. The class also learned about the Good News Jesus shares with us, and how he brings happiness and joy. Invite your child to tell you about Jesus helping the blind, the sick, and the poor. Talk together about who helps your family and the ways your family helps others.

Good News (Grades 2–3): The class studied more of Isaiah's words that showed just what Good News Jesus brings to the world. Ask your child to tell you the story of Juan Diego, the beautiful lady, and the December roses. The image of the Blessed Mother on Juan Diego's cloak is a reminder that Mary is a mother for all of us. Finally, the last page of this week's lesson features a little song from the Magnificat, the great prayer of praise from Mary. Ask your child what his or her favorite song about Jesus is. He or she can also explain who the Messiah is.


Venture (Grades 4–6): Your youngster's class learned about the Advent tradition of the Jesse Tree. Consider having a Jesse Tree in your home. Let your young person head up the project. Talk about the Gospel story of John the Baptist's disciples who came to ask Jesus if he was the One. Discuss the answer Jesus gave to the disciples. What good things did Jesus say about John the Baptist? Finally, let your youngster make suggestions for activities the family can do together to prepare for Christmas. He or she can use the Week 3 Calendar, on page 5, for ideas.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Your young person's class read the story, "A Different Kind of Success." Ask your youngster what the Minnesota robotics team in the story experienced at Christmas. The class also learned about Second Isaiah's hope for a peaceable world. Share ideas of how your family can be peacemakers in your home, Church, community, and world.

The St Vincent de Paul Home Visit Going to Those in Need

At the heart of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul ministry is the "home visit," where volunteers, called "Vincentians", visit neighbors in their homes. When we are contacted, we set up an appointment with the individual to help determine the exact nature and details of help required. We talk with them, as a friend would; we may pray with them; we create a dialogue that allows them to open to us and share what is truly happening in their lives. By visiting them in their homes, we can see, firsthand, the exact situation in which a person is living and experiencing. People who need help often are not able to take time off from work, arrange for childcare, or find transportation to seek resources. Therefore, our volunteers go to them. It is here we can help someone in need-- not only with direct assistance but with emotional and spiritual support. Sometimes, our friends (we do not refer to them as "clients") need a great deal of help, other times someone to pray with is all that is needed. We are there to let our friends know that someone cares. We strive to eliminate the barriers to self-sufficiency created by poverty, incarceration, homelessness, and other distressed situations and turn them into positive and hopefilled new beginnings. The goals are to help people regain self-sufficiency, cultivate positive relationships, and begin to lead responsible lives in their own communities. This is an important and personally rewarding ministry that needs "your" help to help those in need.

IRA Charitable Gifts

A gift through your IRA is a great way to support St Agnes. Here is some information on how you can maximize your giving in 2022:

IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

- Donors age 70½ or older may make a gift of any amount, up to \$100,000 per individual (\$200,000 for couples with individual IRA accounts), from your IRA without paying income tax on the donated amount.
- For donors who have a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), making a gift directly from your IRA to St. Agnes can be counted toward satisfying your RMD for the year, as long as certain rules are met.
- In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.
- QCDs don't require that you itemize, which due to the recent tax law changes, means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving.
- Funds should be transferred directly from the donor's financial institution to St. Agnes.



In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious, or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
