Dear Parishioners,

I once heard it put that religion is a finger pointing to the moon, and the problem comes when all we can see is the finger. As we see in the gospel this week, Joseph had to follow a mystery bigger than he could understand or comprehend. Even his beliefs and traditions could only help him see so far. This also helps us to understand how these New Testament stories were written; they had to use experiences from the Hebrew scriptures to help point towards something entirely new. I like to think of our Catholic faith as a telescope that helps us see the moon though it is not the moon. Using this image, we know that telescopes continue to develop to see planets even further away. This might be a good way of thinking of our tradition. We get new insights that help us see further and this opens new possibilities. One way of looking at Joseph's dream today is that the Holy Spirit helped him see farther and he was awakened to new possibilities that changed how he saw reality and to go beyond what he formerly understood. This is what Pope Francis calls the God of Surprises. May we use the telescope of our faith to see the moon but let's not mistake it as the moon. As we gaze at the sky may it fill us with an awe that the mystery of God's love is always bigger than what we perceive. Let's be open like Mary and Joseph as we move towards Christmas to the God of Surprises.

Join in Renewing, Renaming and Reinvigorating St Agnes' Commitment to Service

Our long-time Social Concerns Chair relocated about the same time Covid struck. Although our meetings came to a halt, many of our members, through creative adaptations, kept ministries alive. Parish nurses gave ongoing advice on covid, one parishioner made "ugly sleeping" bags" at home, parishioners fed the homeless, provided Christmas gift cards for over 200 people in need, bought Haitian coffee to aid Haitian farmers, provided gift cards monthly to Shepherdstown Shares for personal hygiene needs, donated food weekly to JCCM, raised funds to send Kolofata, Cameroon girls to school through potholder sales and donations, started a Zoom racism group, and many more acts of generosity and service too numerous to name. Though many parishioners helped in multiple ways, a good bit of responsibility landed on the shoulders of a few. It is time to renew and reinvigorate these ministries - and perhaps add new ones.

The US Conference of Catholic Bishops refers to its efforts as Justice, Peace and Human Development. The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston just reopened its Justice and Peace Office. To be in tandem with these efforts we are thinking of renaming ourselves either the Justice, Peace and Human Development Committee (JPHD) or the Justice and Peace (J&P) Committee. Please give this some thought.

We need you! We need folks with new energy, new ideas, new interests. We need folks to serve on the coordinating committee and folks to reinvigorate the individual ministries. What would you like to do?

Every year on December 18th, the world marks International Migrants Day, a day set aside to recognize the important contribution of migrants while highlighting the challenges they face. Migrants contribute with their knowledge, networks, and skills to build stronger, more resilient communities.

Be Aware of Holiday Gift Card Scams!

Every holiday season brings on an increase in gift card scams. There are dozens of ways gift cards can be used by scammers to steal money.

Among the ways scammers try to get us is through **Maliciously Modified Gift Cards in Stores**. In this scam, fraudsters steal department store gift cards, learn their secret PIN information, and then replace back onto the shelves to await a victim. When the victim purchases the previously tampered with card and activates it, the fraudster is often able to spend the gift cards value faster than the victim. The fraudster can call the store's gift card line over and over to verify when the gift card is activated and what value is left on the card.

How to prevent? Look for signs of tampering when you buy a gift card. Some people say to pick gift cards from the end of the stack, but that's assuming that the fraudsters will always place the tampered gift cards up front and that the store's staff didn't rearrange them when restocking new gift cards. Know that all the big vendors using gift cards are aware of these scams and many will offer a way for you to protect yourself against this type of scam and some may even reimburse you if you are out money.

Please Don't Fall Victim To Email & Texting Scams!

We continue to hear from far too many parishioners that they are receiving emails or text messages from someone posing as Fr. Andy or Fr. Mat. If you ever receive an email from someone posing as St. Agnes staff asking for money, gift cards, etc., it is a scam.

No one, not Fr Andy nor Fr Mat nor St. Agnes staff, will ever write to you personally asking for 'favors' or to request that you to make a purchase or send money. You can usually tell by looking closely at the email address who sent the message. Emails from St. Agnes always come from <<*email*>>@stagnesshepherdstown.org. Emails from Fr. Andy will be

from aswitzer@stagnesshepherdstown.org

or <u>aswitzer@dwc.org</u>. These scammers are very crafty and often make some very slight variation on the actual email address, so you really have to look very carefully.

If you receive an email similar to this, simply delete it and be aware that email scams, phishing, and more, are part of our digital world. To protect yourself, it's important that you learn how to recognize these scams.

In addition to email, the scammers also use text messaging for their same nefarious purpose. If a text message looks suspicious, it probably is. Once again, no one from St Agnes will ever ask you by text for money or gift cards!

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 1:18-24

Joseph faces a dilemma in this Sunday's Gospel. He is engaged to Mary, but she is pregnant and Joseph is not the father. By legal right, Joseph could accuse Mary of adultery and subject her to the punishment of death by stoning. Instead, Joseph takes her and Baby Jesus to live with him as his wife and adopted son. They form a family circle in which Mary and Joseph raise and nurture Jesus. Matthew points Jesus out as Emmanuel, meaning, "God–with–us," which fulfills Isaiah's ancient description of the Messiah.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K–1): Christmas is just days away, and your child will be filled with anticipation. Waiting gets harder and harder as Christmas nears. Ask your child to share the stories of Joseph and Mary with the angels. Be sure to ask why Joseph and Mary gave Jesus his name. You can also tell your child about his or her name. Talk as a family about all the ways you each have said yes to God's will like Mary and Joseph did. Pray for God's help to continue saying yes to him in your lives.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week your child's class learned about Joseph's fears and excitement leading up to the birth of Jesus. Ask your child to share with the family the Gospel story of Joseph and the angel. Your child also made a "Christmas Prayers Centerpiece." Display this on your kitchen table to remind you to pray together each day leading up to Christmas day.

Adult Faith Formation Courses

Two five-week courses are being offered through the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation (VLCFF) in the first part of 2023. These courses are hybrid models. They are composed of both weekly live two-hour zoom lectures as well as a rich variety of online course materials and discussion experiences through the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community For Faith Formation (VLCFF). The courses are being underwritten by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's Office of Evangelization & Catechesis, who pays 100% of the tuition and the cost of any books associated with the courses. Survey of Catholic Doctrine

January 9th - February 12th, 2023

Have you ever wanted to explore your faith more deeply and understand more clearly the Trinity, Jesus as God's self revealed, the Holy Spirit and much more? We will study some of the major doctrines of the Catholic Church through the five week hybrid course Survey of Catholic Doctrine, a course sponsored through the Diocese of Wheeling Charleston and the University of Dayton Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation, it will run from January 9th to February 12th. There are no prerequisites, just bring your questions and a desire to learn about your faith. This course combines Zoom lectures/discussions once a week on Wednesday evenings from 7-9pm led by Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu with materials available online through the VLCFF website and meets the course requirement for catechetical certification for the diocese. New Testament

January 9th-February 12th, 2023

This course builds on the material learned in Introduction to Scripture and assumes a basic understanding of how Catholics read and interpret Scripture. We will explore the world behind the text of the New Testament, its history and culture, as well as examine how we today read and understand these texts in light of our own world and culture. We will look at how all four Gospels developed, study the letters of Paul, and examine the world of first century Christianity. This is a five-week hybrid course offered through the Diocese and the Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation of the University of Dayton. You will be able to work online taking guizzes and accessing material, as well as meet once a week via Zoom for class lecture and discussion with the course facilitator. Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu. The Zoom sessions will be held on Tuesday evenings at 7pm (a second session on Monday afternoon may be added if the response is large enough). St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

Serving the cause of justice for those relegated to the margins of society cannot be seen as a peripheral or secondary ministry for Christian believers. It was Jesus himself who made such people the central focus of his mission. It is Pope Francis who is once again sounding the Church's call to fulfill its mission to those on the margins. In his emphasis on creating true synodality in the Church where every member of the faithful has a real voice, he has called for special emphasis on listening to the voices of the marginalized, impoverished, and victimized. These include the victims of racial injustice. In his papal teaching in Joy of the Gospel, he stresses that as a Church with a preferential option for the marginalized, we must above all view their voices as central to what the Holy Spirit is calling us to be and witness to in today's world. Serving those on the margins is not so much about evangelizing them as first their "evangelizing" us. Jesus of Nazareth was most often found and criticized for spending his time among the marginalized.

If we hope to bring the Good News to the world, racial justice for all God's children has to be part of that mission. We hope this Racial Justice Initiative in our parish is an aid in accomplishing that goal.

IRA Charitable Gifts & Charitable Benefits Under the CARES ACT

A gift through your IRA is a great way to support St Agnes. Here is some information on how you can maximize your giving in 2022:

IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)

- Donors age 70½ or older may make a gift of any amount, up to \$100,000 per individual (\$200,000 for couples with individual IRA accounts), from your IRA without paying income tax on the donated amount.
- For donors who have a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), making a gift directly from your IRA to St. Agnes can be counted toward satisfying your RMD for the year, as long as certain rules are met.
- In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare.
- QCDs don't require that you itemize, which due to the recent tax law changes, means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving.
- Funds should be transferred directly from the donor's financial institution to St. Agnes.

Missing Photograph



In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
