Dear Parishioners,

As we begin the Lenten season, I think it is important that we realize what this season is all about. This time of year is supposed to be a season of healing and renewal to journey with those who are moving towards Easter sacraments. A good example of this is the Scrutinies that are special prayers we pray with those who are preparing for baptism. These prayers are intended to lead the catechumenes to deeper freedom as sons and daughters of God. This is also the call to those of us that are already baptized. As we move towards Easter, what needs to be healed in us so that we can more deeply experience the freedom that the Lord wants to give us; so that we might better live out the mercy of God for those around us? Today's gospel is the story of Jesus in the desert. He certainly fasted, but he feasted on the Father's love. The desert, in biblical imagery, was often an image of a honeymoon period where we grow in our trust and dependence on God's love that wants to heal us so that we could be instruments of peace and healing for our world.

MINISTRY: Ministry of the Lector

Those who desire to serve as Lector should be active and faithful members of the Church. The Ministry of the Lector is a person who agrees to serve the Church as a **PROCLAIMER** of the Word of God. The introduction to the Lectionary for Mass also calls for a spiritual preparation for **PROCLAIMING** the Word of God. When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his word, proclaims the Gospel. Therefore, the readings from the Word of God are to be listened to reverently by everyone, for they are an element of the greatest importance in the Liturgy.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE: As Lectors we are called by God to strive to reflect on the meaning of our faith, our community and our personal call to serve the Lord. **Act with reverence:** stand, walk, kneel, speak, sing, and serve reverently. Realize that our service is more than a job or a profession. The Lector is the storyteller of the community. It is a ministry flowing from the power of our Baptism. It is a gift, a right and a responsibility. By means of our initiation into the Church and strengthened by grace, God empowers each person with the resources for ministry. Every Christian is called to ministry and gifted by the Holy Spirit.







The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 1:12-15

In the Sunday Gospel, the Holy Spirit leads Jesus into the wilderness for forty days. The desert is a place of testing, but it is also a place to be close to God. Jesus' time in the desert calls us to make Lent a season of growth, a season for developing habits that will make us more loving toward God and one another.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K-1): As Lent begins, your child learned that he or she can do loving actions and can pray. Remember that, for the most part, young children will do these things in the context of the family. Talk about loving actions your family can do during Lent and set aside a time for family prayer. Ask your child to share the prayer box he or she made in class.

Good News (Grades 2-3): This week, your child learned about God's covenant with Noah. Ask your child to tell of God's promise. The class also learned that God is always near us. Take some time to make a family plan of special prayers and actions for the Lenten season. Ask your child to share the story of Saint Mark, "A Man of Faith and Courage." Discuss, too, the actions of the Lenten Calendar made during class.


Venture (Grades 4-6): One of the most important words in our religious vocabulary is *covenant*. This week, your youngster's class

learned about the covenant with Noah and how, under the sign of a rainbow, God made a new relationship with his People. During this first week of Lent, make a family covenant—an agreement to spend the season doing good things for others, making personal and family sacrifices, and praying together as a family. It would be good to put your family covenant in writing. See the examples of covenants from the lesson.

Visions (Grades 7-9): In this week's lesson, the young people discussed whether they would get involved when they see injustice committed against a neighbor or friend. As Jesus faces a test in the desert, ask: How do we stand up when we are tested? Since young people are not required to fast, they have traditionally given up treats during Lent. You can ask your young person to share the questionnaire that shows how you might be recognized as a Christian.

Pray Together

An important part of the Lenten discipline is prayer. When you complete your conversation about Sunday's Gospel lesson, some evening during a family meal, share a special prayer that your forty days of Lent will help your family grow in the love of God and love of others too. Ask each family member to say a prayer in his or her own words.

The Synod Continues in the Diocese

Continuing on our journey as a Synodal Church, faithful from around the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston are asked to attend a gathering in their vicariate (Charleston, Martinsburg, Beckley, Clarksburg, Parkersburg, and Wheeling) between Feb 21- March 7. Each gathering will be a synodal listening session to address two questions posed by the General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, who met in Rome last October.

- Where have I seen or experienced successes—and distresses—within the Church's structure(s)/organization/leadership/life that encourage or hinder the mission?
- How can the structures and organization of the Church help all the baptized to respond to the call to proclaim the Gospel and to live as a community of love and mercy in Christ?

The sessions will be held Feb. 21 at the Saint John XXIII Pastoral Center in Charleston, **Feb. 22 at St. Leo Church in Inwood**, Feb. 27 at St. Francis de Sales Church in Beckley, Feb. 28 at Immaculate Conception Church in Clarksburg, Feb. 29 at St. Francis Xavier Church in Parkersburg, and March 7 at St. Michael Church in Wheeling. All sessions will begin at 6:30 p.m. and everyone is encouraged to attend.
