Preparing for Lent

Fasting Guidelines

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by everyone 18 years and older, who has not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, enough to maintain strength, may be taken, according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but consuming liquids, including milk and juices, is allowed. In addition, fasting can also take the form of deliberate abstinence from things other than food such as selfishness, gossip, bickering, sloth, electronics, television, smoking, etc.

Abstinence Guidelines

Abstinence is observed by everyone 14 years of age or older. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. Note that when health or the ability to work is affected, the law does not oblige. Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays during Lent, and Good Friday are days of abstinence. If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, other suitable forms of self-denial are encouraged.

On Ash Wednesday, February 22, we will have a Mass at noon. At 7pm, we will host an ecumenical service with Liturgy of the Word and Distribution of Ashes.

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend at St Agnes at the Masses we will be bringing the catechumenates preparing for baptism and the candidates who will be preparing to enter more deeply into communion with the church. The question asked of them is "What do you ask of the church?" Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote a book called The Cost of Discipleship which is about the Sermon on the Mount that we have been reflecting upon and is our gospel this weekend. Bonhoeffer, who stood against Nazis and would lose his life under Hitler, once said there is no such thing as "cheap grace." God's grace is free, but it is also costly. My mind and heart all this week has been turning to Nicaragua where political prisoners and Catholic priests were deported from the country by a dictator, Daniel Ortega. Bishop Rolando Alvarez understands costly grace and, in an act of civil disobedience for his country and people, refused to get on the plane. Pope Francis offers these words. "The news from Nicaragua has saddened me a great deal, and I cannot but remember with concern Bishop Rolando Álvarez of Matagalpa, whom I care about greatly, sentenced to 26 years imprisonment, and also those who have been deported to the United States. I pray for them and for all those who are suffering in that dear nation, and I ask for your prayers. Let us also ask the Lord, by the intercession of the Immaculate Virgin Mary, to open the hearts of political leaders and all citizens to the sincere search for peace, which is born of truth, justice, freedom and love, and which is achieved through the patient pursuit of dialogue. Let us pray together to Our Lady," he said.

In a time when in our country, because of scandal and crisis, it is difficult to make an argument for the Church, Dietrich Bonhoeffer and Bishop Rolando are perhaps the best argument. The origins of the church are not the state, and the church has always had its prophetic witnesses who have been able to stand up for human rights and justice. We can certainly think of Martin Luther King as an example of this in our country. Let's pray for Bishop Rolando but also reflect on what actions this Lent we might take to bring about systemic change to structures of oppression. The church is called to be nonpartisan, but that also means that it has a responsibility to enter into politics because tyrants only surrender under political pressure. We have a responsibility to do all that we can as Catholics in America, who have the privilege to live in a democracy, to stand up for the human rights of all people and nations and, in this case, our neighbor, Nicaragua.

Auxiliary Bishop Silvio Baez of Managua exiled in Miami had this to say about Bishop Rolando and what is happening in Nicaragua: "Those who put righteous people in jail and banish citizens from their own country are criminals. These abominable acts are not just the whims of deranged people, legal irregularities or non-compliance with international rules. No. To offend in anger, to defame out of revenge, to imprison unjustly, to torture viciously and to condemn to exile are true crimes and those who act in this way are criminals, who will have to be brought to justice sooner or later," Baez said.

New Course Offerings

Below are the upcoming courses for the next Cycle of VLCFF which runs from February 27 to April 2. Both of these courses will be facilitated by Dr. Rodica Stoiciu. They are hybrid courses that include both online material through the VLCFF website and a weekly, two hour Zoom lecture/discussion. These are available to everyone in the diocese as usual **at no cost**.

Introduction to Prayer

"Prayer is our means of taking a sighting, of re-orienting ourselves – by re-establishing contact with our goal. In the presence of God many components of our life fall into perspective and our journey makes more sense. Prayer is inseparable from living" (Casey, p.5). This course explores prayer as essential to our lives as Christian people, as individuals and within our community of faith. Through this course, students will explore the qualities, forms and expressions of prayer that help to form and sustain our lives as Catholic Christians. Successful completion of this course earns 2.5 CEU's. This course is part of the VLCFF Certificate for Certification sequence. We will meet on Zoom on Wednesday evenings at 7 pm.

Introduction to Paul and Paul's Letters

The course is an in-depth look at Paul, including his autobiography according to his letters, then moving on to discuss the authentic letters of Paul as both history and theology. We will cover topics such as Paul and Politics, Paul and Women, Paul and the Second Coming, Paul and Slavery, Paul and Judaism, and Paul on Salvation and Suffering throughout the five weeks of this course. Students will read a variety of materials including some of the most important articles written about Paul in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. At the completion of this course students will be able to situate Paul in his first-century environment and talk intelligently about how Paul's theology is relevant for today's church. Successful completion of this course earns 2.5 CEU's. We will meet on Zoom on Tuesday evenings at 7 pm.

Ash Wednesday Special Collection

On February 6, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake devastated large areas of southern Turkey and northwest Syria. The death toll has surpassed 20,000 and continues to climb. Thousands of people have been injured and many are trapped beneath the rubble. The earthquake is the worst to strike Turkey this century. Within the subsequent 24 hours, the region experienced multiple aftershocks and a second 7.5 magnitude quake. Across affected areas, apartment buildings and schools have been leveled. Telecommunications are disrupted, preventing families from identifying and accounting for missing loved ones. In Syria, displaced people are seeking shelter in schools and community centers in areas already devastated by years of war. Across southern Turkey, schools are closed, airport transportation is impaired and hospitals have been declared unusable.

Catholic Relief Services is supporting local partners in their efforts to provide urgent relief and assistance for long-term recovery. CRS has partnerships with Caritas Turkey and Caritas Syria, as well as other local partners. To support the efforts of these organizations, Most Rev. Mark Brennan, Bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, has approved a special collection to be held on Ash Wednesday, February 22, 2023, and for collection baskets to remain available for the collection through the first Sunday of Lent. Bishop Brennan appreciates your generosity this past summer to those affected by the severe storms and flooding in Eastern Kentucky and Southern West Virginia. But he feels impelled once again to ask you to do what you can to help those affected by this most recent disaster.

All funds collected in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will be given to Catholic Relief Services with the special designation for use in the Turkey/Syria Earthquake Recovery Effort. Checks can be made out to St Agnes with "Disaster Relief" on the memo line. Donations can also be made on the diocesan website at <https://dwc.org/disaster-relief/>.

As we hold the victims and first responders in our prayers during these critical days, let us also spend time in prayer and discernment as we prepare for this upcoming collection. Let us come together now to support our brothers and sisters in Christ who are suffering this horrible loss.

Lenten Fast and Abstinence

During Lent, Christians remember and share the time Jesus spent in the desert, when he fasted and prayed to prepare for his journey to his Death. In remembrance of Jesus' sacrifice—his suffering and Death on the Cross—Christians join with Jesus to prepare for Easter with works of penance, including fasting and abstinence. To fast is to limit the kind and quantity of food and drink. To abstain is to do without a kind of food or drink.

The Church requires all Catholics fourteen years of age and older to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics from the ages of eighteen to sixty are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

To meet the Church's fasting and abstinence requirements for Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all the Fridays of Lent, Catholics:

- ⊗ Eat only one regular size meal
- ⊗ Eat two smaller meals (or less) in addition to the main meal
- ⊗ Do not eat or snack between meals
- ⊗ Do not eat any meat, soup made with meat, gravy, broth, or any other dish prepared with meat

• Out of love for God and others, Catholics are also encouraged to volunteer to make other sacrifices during Lent:

- ⊗ To give up a favorite food or television program
- ⊗ To perform extra acts of charity and kindness
- ⊗ To read and meditate on the Sunday Gospels
- ⊗ To pray the Stations of the Cross
- ⊗ To unite their own sacrifices with the sacrifice and suffering of Christ

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 5:38-48

Jesus asks us to go beyond treating others in the same way we want to be treated ourselves. He asks us to care for each other as God does—to love other people without expecting love in return and to even love to our enemies. This is an invitation that may take a lifetime to grow into and fulfill. It is a challenge for the family to keep this message alive in a world that puts a premium on competition and on being "better."

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): All parents want their children to live by the Golden Rule and so must be role models for this behavior. The Golden Rule lesson is best learned within the home. Ask your child to share the booklet the class made and talk about how reconciliation helps us all be good friends.

Promise (Grades K-1): Jesus taught us that we must love and forgive our enemies. Your child explored the call to turn the other cheek and walk the extra mile. Talk with your child about how members of the family need to forgive one another. Support that conversation by being quick to forgive your child when he or she needs mercy.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Ask your child to share what Jesus said about forgiveness. Give examples of ways your family can show love to your "enemies." Ask your child to share the story of "Mean Manny," and how Olivia handled someone bullying them. How does mercy help us treat others as God does?

Venture (Grades 4-6): Young people are most sensitive to bullying words. In class this week, your youngster talked about the effect that these kinds of words have on young people.

They also read and discussed different endings to a story about bullying. Invite your young person to share this story with the family. Talk about what Jesus means when he asks that you love your enemies and to pray for those who do you harm. Discuss how important forgiveness is for the good of your family. Talk, too, about how praying the Our Father can help you learn how to forgive.

Visions (Grades 7-9): One of the most difficult of Jesus' teaching is "turning the other cheek." In class, your youngster was asked to wrestle with this statement. Encourage your young person to share with the family why this was so important to Jesus and how it can work in society. Ask your youngster to tell you about the Ulster Project and its mission to restore peace in Northern Ireland. Review the four moral codes with your son or daughter, and discuss which ones are appropriate to live by. How does Jesus' New Law affect how we treat, and are treated by, others?

Pray Together

Set aside some time for the whole family to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation as we approach Lent. There may be a penance service at your parish church, or you can go together at one of the times when private confession is being offered. Even though your younger children have not yet received the sacrament, it would be good for them to see their parents and older siblings participating. When you get home together, thank God for the gift of forgiveness.

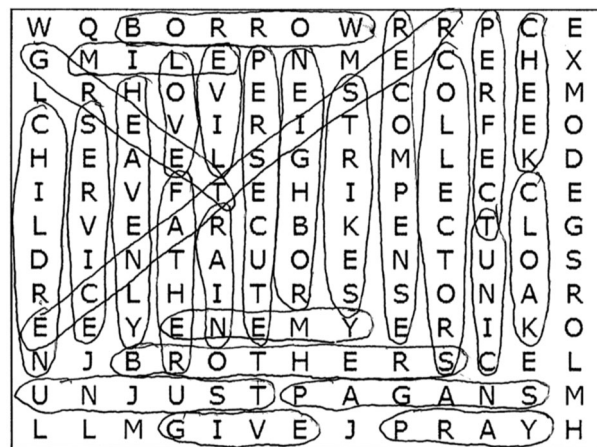

Our Policy for Protecting Our Children

Please know that we follow the Diocesan Safe Environment Program in all our youth programs. All staff and volunteers who work with youth are required to complete the Diocese of Wheeling Charleston's Safe Environment program. **All** adult parishioners are **encouraged** to complete the program to increase awareness and provide a safe environment for the children of our parish and greater community. The process is completely online now. There are directions available in the Narthex for both creating a new Virtus account as well as directions available to help you log into your VIRTUS account if you already have an account.

Safe Environment Certification includes:

1. Virtus workshop — Complete online training at www.virtusonline.org. Step-by-step instructions are available.
2. Background Check — Completing Screening One form
3. Diocesan Policy — Reading the Diocesan Policy Relating to Sexual Abuse of Children & completing the DWC Policy form

All of the above steps are now completed online. If you do not have access for this online procedure, please contact St. Agnes Parish Office at 304-876-6436.

If you already have a VIRTUS account, log into your account and complete any required updates. If you are new to VIRTUS, select the green box "First-time Registrant" and follow the prompts to create an account and to complete the required training and paperwork.

St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

There will be a new book added to our Racial Justice Library in the church narthex this Sunday, The Crucible of Racism, by Patrick Saint-Jean, SJ. It is authored by a Black, Haitian-born, son of Southern Baptist parents, who became a Catholic and then came to the US to become a Jesuit. It is a unique story that is also an engaging reflection on racism, the Church, and finding a hopeful path forward in dealing with the call to racial justice, motivated by the example of his maternal grandmother, Tatíe, and informed by the practices of his cherished Ignatian spirituality.

The book is being donated by Kimberly Rae Connor, a current member of our RCIA group who is planning to join our St. Agnes community. She is a college professor with a special background in African religions and also a friend of the author.

Rev. Bryan Massingale, the author of Racial Justice and the Catholic Church, says of the book: "This is a courageous book. It was written by someone who has endured the crucible of disappointment to emerge as a visionary of hope. He takes his readers on a spiritual retreat that confronts injustice as it fosters growth in friendship with Jesus."
