

#### Dear Parishioners,

Today's readings are about listening and discernment. This is really where we are as a church during this time of the synod. The story of Eli and Samuel really shows what discernment is about; it is having an openness to listening to the Lord, and the recognition that we need each other's help to do that. I have learned that the best mentors or quides in my life have been those that do not give the answer, but rather they either ask the right question or have pointed me in the right direction. This is what Eli does for Samuel. He points him in the right direction and shows him the right posture to have, and Samuel is led deeper into the mystery of God's love and discovers his call. I really believe this is what the liturgy we celebrate is supposed to do: pull us into the greater mystery of God's love that provides orientation and direction for our lives in the week ahead. The gospel today is the call of discipleship, and Jesus asks the disciples a question, "What are you looking for?" I recently heard Pope Francis say that God more often comes to us with questions rather than answers. The powerful thing about the question, "what are you looking for," is that Jesus' desire is to fulfill the greatest desires of the human heart. This is a principle of good spirituality, that our greatest potential for love or human desires are from the Lord and we should pay attention to those. The disciples desire to stay with Jesus. This gives their lives a certain orientation and direction where they will be called to a life of ministry and service which will be a great adventure. Their call is also ours as followers of Jesus.

## Racial Justice Initiative News

As we celebrate the Martin Luther King, Jr. federal holiday, let us acknowledge that the inspiration and continuing motive for his work for racial and economic justice was directly related to his desire to follow Jesus of Nazareth. It was an essential expression of his Christian faith. He saw himself as a hopeful and devoted servant of the Kingdom of God that Jesus embodied.

Cornell West, philosopher and professor at Union Theological Seminary, sums it up this way:

"The American Dream is individualistic. King's is seen as collective. The American Dream says, 'I can engage in upward mobility and live the good life.' King's dream was fundamentally Christian. His commitment to radical love had everything to do with his commitment to Jesus of Nazareth and his dream had everything to do with community, with a 'we' consciousness that included poor and working people around the world, not just black people." Also this from Martin Luther King, Jr. himself from his final sermon on the night before he was assassinated:

"Like everybody I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And He's allowed me to go the mountain. And I have looked over. And I have seen the promised land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight, that we, as a people, will get to the promised land. So I'm happy tonight. I'm not worried about anything. I'm not fearing any man. Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord."

Martin Luther King, Jr. is an example to all who claim to be Christian of how to be one.

## Ugly Sleeping Bag Ministry

We want to thank all parishioners of St. Agnes Catholic Church and Shepherdstown Presbyterian Church for donating all the supplies that go into making sleeping bags and those parishioners that have donated old used sleeping bags. ## Feeding the Homeless and Hungry

We began the New Year with Ellen Potter and her husband preparing and serving the community meal, also known as the Hungry and Homeless Meal, on January 3 at the Zion Episcopal Church in Charles Town. At our request, Ellen shared this information to give some insight into what goes into the work of this ministry:

"My husband and I provided meals this past Wednesday night and after your previous email, I was curious as to what we spent. First, let me tell you what we served: pulled pork sandwiches with homemade Cole slaw, Greek pasta salad, and brownies. We also provided BBQ sauce, 2 pieces of fruit (banana and clementine), and water.

The total cost was around \$203. The biggest savings was when pork butts were on sale for \$.99/lb a few weeks ago so we bought six and froze them until we needed them. Otherwise, they are \$2.99/lb, which would have added another \$90 dollars to the total."

The manager of Food Lion permitted Ellen to exceed the limit on the amount of pork she could purchase at the discounted price when she explained why she was purchasing. So, our thanks to Shepherstown Food Lion! Heartfelt thanks go out to all of our chefs and to all of you


# All St Agnes Volunteers... Must Be VIRTUS Trained

The Diocese of Wheeling Charleston requires that all volunteers in all parishes, schools, etc., must be Virtus trained. And they will soon be auditing to verify compliance. If you volunteer in any capacity at St Agnes, you must do the training!

VIRTUS training is designed to help adults recognize the signs that indicate a child or vulnerable adult might be suffering abuse. It also helps adults by offering key points to help children and adults, who might confide in them, deal with potential situations. Finally, it helps adults know who to contact and what the next steps are if they suspect or discover a child or vulnerable adult is being abused. All this training is designed to help adults help others through a difficult situation.

It is truly in the best interests of everyone to have all volunteers VIRTUS trained.

The good news is that the training is all online and can be completed in a short period of time. Our Coordinator, Bill Donahue, can assist with verifying your training status and/or initiating your training. 
**<u>RCIA and RCIC</u>**: We will meet on Jan 14th at Noon in the Parish Center.



## The Gospel at Home

#### This Sunday's Gospel: John 1:35-42

In this Sunday's Gospel, John the Baptist points to Jesus as "the Lamb of God." The Gospel also tells of the call of the first disciples. The story echoes the call of each member of the Churchto share in the mission of Jesus, his joy, and his sufferings. The title "Lamb of God" links Jesus to the symbol of Israel's redemption-the Paschal Lamb.

#### Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K-1): This week, your child explored the experience of having friends among family, schoolmates, and neighbors. Your child learned how Jesus made friends and gathered followers. Ask your child to show the story cutout he or she made in class and tell how all of us are connected to one another and to Jesus.

Good News (Grades 2-3): This week, your child learned about the Liturgy of the Word at Mass. Ask your child to tell you about this part of the Mass. The family can also play together the "Jesus, Come and See!" game. Talk about ways your family can show that you are followers of Jesus.

Venture (Grades 4-6): The class learned about one of the Church's more recently canonized saints, Pope Saint John XXIII, and how he helped to renew and change the Church. Ask your youngster to tell you about Saint John.

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The class also discussed vocations and learned that everyone has a call from God. Some are called to serve in a special way. Talk about the vocations to the priesthood, sisterhood, and brotherhood and others who serve. Have your son or daughter to tell you about Saint André of Montreal. Ask to see the set of cards members of the class made, including your young person's own patron saint.



Visions (Grades 7-8): This week's lesson focused on God's call-a person's vocation. The young people discussed the various ways people live out their Christian vocation. Ask your son or daughter to share with the family the story of Jesuit Father Rutilio Grande, whose defense of the poor led to his death. Talk about ways your family can be good and true disciples of Jesus and what it means to live a holy life. Talk, too, about helping one another discover what God's calling is for each of you.

#### Pray Together

When you complete your conversation about the week's Gospel lesson, try to join in a morning prayer or an evening prayer together each day for a week. The prayer does not have to be formal or structured, and it certainly does not need to be long. Pray together in your own words, too, that God will call good leaders and ministers for the Church and that each member of your family will be open to listening to God's call and answering with a resounding yes!



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### New Virtual Learning Courses

Two 5-week courses are being offered through the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation (VLCFF). These hybrid models are composed of both weekly live 2-hour zoom lectures as well as a rich variety of online course materials and discussion experiences. The courses are being underwritten by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston's Office of Evangelization & Catechesis, who pays 100% of the tuition and the cost of any books associated with the courses. **Ecclesiology: Pilgrim Church** (Begins Week of January 15)

This is the second in a series of courses on the theology of the Church and builds on the course The Beginnings of the Church. We will continue our exploration of the Church and how, as a living organism, it both maintains its continuity with Jesus and reshapes its own selfunderstanding. We will examine questions of authority, community and governance and look at social and political changes in the Church through the 15<sup>th</sup> century. This will then aid our conversation as we look at Vatican II and its understanding of the episcopal and papal offices and the models of Church presented by the Council. You will be able to work online taking guizzes and accessing material, as well as meet once a week via Zoom for class lecture and discussion with the course facilitator. The Zoom sessions will be held on Mondays at 7pm for 5 weeks, beginning January 15<sup>th</sup>.

Introduction to Scripture (Begins Week of January 15)

If you are new to studying the Bible, have questions about reading the Bible, want to learn more about the Bible but don't know where to start; or, if you are working towards your certification for catechesis, this course is for you!! Learn what the Bible is and where it comes from, understand how Roman Catholics read the Bible and what the differences are between a Catholic Bible and a Protestant Bible, start to build your Bible vocabulary by learning about the synoptic Gospels, what is inspiration, and much more. You will be able to work online taking guizzes and accessing material, as well as meet once a week via Zoom for class lecture and discussion with the course facilitator. The Zoom sessions will be held on Wednesdays at 7 pm for 5 weeks beginning January 17th. This course is part of the course sequence for level one catechist certification.

#### **Glass Recycling**

## Spotlight on Ministry

My Name is Robbie Babbitt. My wife and I have been attending St. Agnes since 2019. My faith has been a continual response to the grace of God. No matter how I move away, I am always called back. As a young adult, I rejected the Church outright. The emphasis on rote allegiance to the ideology and hierarchy turned me off. I was first brought back by a messenger of God when I married my wife, Maggie. As time went by, I realized that I was letting my rejection of the structure of the Church stand in the way of my relationship with Jesus. I decided it was time I moved toward Jesus and let go of my ego that kept focusing on what is wrong with the Church.

My first ministry was as Eucharistic Minister at Mother of Sorrows in Centreville, Maryland. This is where we raised our family and belonged for over 20 years. I was asked to serve by our good friend Father William Lawler. Though I didn't feel "faithfully adequate" to be in this position, I accepted whole heartedly. When the skies did not burst open and strike me with lightening, I figured God must be calling me.

I am now an Altar Server and a Eucharistic Minister here at St. Agnes. I was never an Altar Server as a child so I find it amusing that I became a Server at the young age of 68! God calls us in funny ways. I see my ministry as a model of how we can all contribute to the Mass. No one will judge whether you are worthy to take part in the Mass. Your willingness to answer the call is all that matters.

Traditionally, Catholics bless their home and those who live in their household on the Feast of the Epiphany each year. We have blessed chalk in the Narthex available for you to take home. Here is the blessing:

All: Make the Sign of the Cross.

Leader or Head of Household:

Peace to this house and to all who dwell here, in the name of the Lord.

All: Blessed be God forever!

#### Reader:

God our Father, source of love and harmony, bless our home. In our kitchen, nourish us with stories and spirit. Help us remember here Jesus' gift of himself in a meal. In our bedroom, give us rest. Make them peaceful places, where we find energy to serve your people who do your work.

In our living room, give us strength to welcome all guests, Christ in disguise. May we be blessed with heath, goodness of heart, gentleness, and the keeping of your law. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out to all.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

This is the date of the new year and the names of the Magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar). This is also an abbreviation for the Latin prayer *Christus Mansionem Benedicat* (*May Christ bless this house*).

EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
