
# Saint Agnes

#### Racial Justice Initiative News

The blues is seldom associated with Martin Luther King, Jr. but its idiom is foundational to his life and ministry. In an opening address to the 1964 Berlin Jazz Festival, King offered remarks that give us insight on the relationship between the blues and religious faith. King begins by identifying the blues as originating from a divine source: "God has wrought many things out of oppression. He has endowed his creatures with the capacity to create—and from this capacity has flowed the sweet songs of sorrow and joy that have allowed man to cope with his environment and many different situations...The Blues tell the story of life's difficulties, and if you think for a moment, you will realize that they take the hardest realities of life and put them into music, only to come out with some new hope or sense of triumph. This is triumphant music." He goes on to suggest that jazz "has continued in this tradition, singing the songs of a more complicated urban existence. When life itself offers no order and meaning, the musician creates order and meaning from the sounds of the earth which flow through his instrument." He continues by crediting musicians as the leaders in the American search for identity and the inspiration behind his movement. "Long before the modern essayists and scholars wrote of racial identity as a problem for a multiracial world, musicians were returning to their roots to affirm that which was stirring within their souls. Much of the power of our Freedom Movement in the United States has come from this music. It has strengthened us with its sweet rhythms when courage began to fail. It has calmed us with its rich harmonies when spirits were down." King concludes by lifting his comments out of the particular and in to the universal: "For in the particular struggle of the Negro in America there is something akin to the universal struggle of modern man. Everybody has the Blues. Everybody longs for meaning. Everybody needs to love and be loved. Everybody needs to clap hands and be happy. Everybody longs for faith. In music, especially this broad category called Jazz, there is a stepping-stone towards all of these."

For King, the blues were an effective guide on how to serve as an agent for social change. By bearing witness to the truth of our circumstances, Martin Luther King, Jr. was a bluesman who offered a model for how to live a sanctified life. There will always be a reason to sing the blues. But sometimes when the song is sung, it tells a story that makes you want to pray along with Dr. King that "the deep fog of misunderstanding will be lifted from our fear-drenched communities and in some not too distant tomorrow the radiant stars of love and brotherhood will shine over our great nation with all their scintillating beauty."

# Feeding the Homeless and Hungry

We began the New Year with Ellen Potter and her husband preparing and serving the community meal, also known as the Hungry and Homeless Meal, on January 3 at the Zion Episcopal Church in Charles Town. At our request, Ellen shared this information to give some insight into what goes into the work of this ministry:

"My husband and I provided meals this past Wednesday night and after your previous email, I was curious as to what we spent. First, let me tell you what we served: pulled pork sandwiches with homemade Cole slaw, Greek pasta salad, and brownies. We also provided BBQ sauce, 2 pieces of fruit (banana and clementine), and water.

The total cost was around \$203. The biggest savings was when pork butts were on sale for \$.99/lb a few weeks ago so we bought six and froze them until we needed them. Otherwise, they are \$2.99/lb, which would have added another \$90 dollars to the total."

The manager of Food Lion permitted Ellen to exceed the limit on the amount of pork she could purchase at the discounted price when she explained why she was purchasing. So, our thanks to Shepherstown Food Lion! Heartfelt thanks go out to all of our chefs and to all of you who support this ministry in all the ways that you do. 
# All St Agnes Volunteers... Must Be VIRTUS Trained

The Diocese of Wheeling Charleston requires that all volunteers in all parishes, schools, etc., must be Virtus trained. And they will soon be auditing to verify compliance. If you volunteer in any capacity at St Agnes, you must do the training!

VIRTUS training is designed to help adults recognize the signs that indicate a child or vulnerable adult might be suffering abuse. It also helps adults by offering key points to help children and adults, who might confide in them, deal with potential situations. Finally, it helps adults know who to contact and what the next steps are if they suspect or discover a child or vulnerable adult is being abused. All this training is designed to help adults help others through a difficult situation.

It is truly in the best interests of everyone to have all volunteers VIRTUS trained.

The good news is that the training is all online and can be completed in a short period of time. Our Coordinator, Bill Donahue, can assist with verifying your training status and/or initiating your training. # Religious Item Recycling

St. Mary Recycle Mission Group has been working with Catholic churches, Convents, Schools, The Knights of Columbus, and other organizations, as well as with Parishioners who have things at home in helping rescue and recycle used Religious items that are no longer needed. Over the last 25 years, they have helped recycle items from Churches that have items from former Clergy that are no longer being used, or from Churches that unfortunately closed, as well as from Parishioners who need to place their personal religious items from home that they don't know what to do with. Over the years, they have found many of these items in the trash so they came up with a recycling program. They originally got started after finding several items cleared out from a church basement in the dumpster of a local church all in perfectly usable condition. They later found that there is a need for these unwanted items. Their first large effort was following Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans as they sent hundreds of recycled items to a parish there that was more than happy to accept items for both the parish and parishioners that they had gathered.

The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the

identity of the person reporting is protected.
