If you have been following the news the past week, you may be aware that Emeritus Pope Benedict XVI died on December 28. I think his death reminds us that, if you look at the whole of a person's life, they are much more complex than the limitations we can place upon them. I think that is why it would be true that when it came to the internal life of the church Pope Benedict 16th was conservative, but, as journalist Tom Reese this week pointed out, on many social issues he was very progressive. Perhaps this is a lesson for us to be careful not to freeze others with our labels; that there is probably more to a person than we see on the surface. This is only my opinion, but I want to offer two ways that I think Pope Benedict played, historically, a giant significant role in the reforms and implementation of the Second Vatican Council.

First, we should remember the young Joseph Ratzinger, as a priest, was a peritus at the council. Father Joseph Ratzinger was a giant of a theologian that was certainly considered a progressive. If you read some of his writings at that time, he was calling for the humble church that Pope Francis today is trying to implement. If you do study the council and read the debates, you will find that Joseph Ratzinger is a giant figure in many of the debates and, in many ways, was a key leader as a theologian that helped guide the church into the future of the contemporary world. The second very significant thing that Pope Benedict XVI did was that he had the humility and courage to step down as Pope. This is extremely significant because it is the first time in 600 years that a Pope has resigned. This will be important, I believe, historically because it allows for a healthy, necessary demystification of the papacy. The role of Pope,

or probably better called Bishop of Rome, important as it is, is also subject to all the human limitations even as by the gift of God's grace it is an important leadership role especially for the unity of the universal church. Pope Benedict's resignation allowed for Pope Francis to be passed the baton to help direct and guide our church in the next stages of the development and reform of the council that we see with the Synod on Synodality.

I offer this final thought: one of the theologians that Joseph Ratzinger worked closely with at the council was priest and theologian Hans Kung. As time went on, they took very different views-Ratzinger being considered more conservative while Kung's perspective was more liberal. When Cardinal Ratzinger became Pope, he had lunch at the Vatican and spent a long time with his old friend, priest Hans Kung. I, like many others, would have loved to be a fly on the wall at that lunch. I think though it reminds us that in a world of polarization and division what unites us is greater than what divides. I once heard it alluded to by a scripture scholar that what keeps the Roman Catholic church in communion with each other, if you took a priest like Hans Kung who would be considered the most liberal and took someone who was considered to be as conservative as Pope Benedict, the Eucharist still reminds us that we are one. I like to think that Hans Kung and Joseph Ratzinger greeted each other in heaven, maybe even had lunch, and realize that when it comes to the mystery of God's love, they both only saw in this life a small piece of the mystery. Now they see the fullness of it.



Family Guide January 8 & 9, 2023

Epiphany & Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 2:1-12 and Matthew 3:13-17

The account of the Magi traveling to the infant Jesus opens this week's lessons. They honor Jesus as the king of all people. The Baptism of the Lord ir also recounted from the Gospel of Matthew. When Jesus approached John the Baptist to be baptized, John hesitated saying, "I need to be baptized by you." Still, Jesus said it was fitting for him to be baptized by John. When John baptized Jesus, the Holy Trinity comes together when the Holy Spirit descends as a dove, and the Father speaks from heaven, saying: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): This week's class focused on Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist and how Jesus' grew up in a loving family like many of our own families. Talk about your favorite memories of your child's younger years. Also ask to see the picture of a baby's Baptism that they colored during class. Share your memories of you child's Baptism and maybe photos of your own Baptism.

Promise (Grades K-1): First your child helped the Magi find the newborn Jesus through a maze. This week's lesson also focused on Jesus' baptism by John and on the Holy Trinity, which was present at Jesus' baptism. Talk about the tools that workers need to do their jobs and share what tools you use for your work. Talk about the mystery of the Holy Trinity and add all three Persons to your prayers this week.

Good News (Grades 2-3): This week's lesson talks about how the Magi honored Jesus and about Baptism and family ties. Have your child recall the words of Baptism from the lesson. Friends talk about their family ties in the story on page 2. Discuss your family's nationality and share stories of each other's Baptisms, with photos, if possible. Discuss the mystery of the Holy Trinity, which is a big part of the Gospel story of Jesus' baptism. Recall with your children how we remember the Holy Trinity in the Sign of the Cross.


Venture (Grades 4-6): Your youngster's class discussed the Magi's visit to see Jesus and how we belong to God's family. Talk about how the various countries mentioned in the lesson celebrate the birth of Jesus. Ask where the Magi came from and also what happens when Jesus is baptized by John. Your youngster can tell you the stories. Go over how we celebrate Baptisms and be sure to share stories from each family member's Baptism, with photos if possible.

Visions (Grades 7-9): The mystery of the Holy Trinity is a key theme of this week's lesson. Talk with your youngster about how the young people from the Tijuana Ministry fulfill the work of the Holy Trinity. Take time to visit the ministry's website to see more about the work members do. How was your family involved in your young person's Baptism? Let them know some of the roles played by extended family members. Ask your youngster what it was like to play The Family Feelings Game.

Pray Together

After discussing so much about the Holy Trinity and Baptism this week, consider emphasizing the Sign of the Cross before and after family prayers. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Pray that your family can love others in the way that the Holy Trinity loves the world.

St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

This weekend there will be two new books added to our Racial Justice Library in the church narthex that are worthy of your attention.

The first, <u>Under The Skin - The Hidden Toll of Racism on</u> <u>American lives and on the Health of Our Nation</u>, by Linda Villarosa, was published in 2022. Information from this book has been shared the past two weeks in the Racial Justice Initiative News in the bulletin. It is a revealing, sobering, well-documented account of the present challenges people of color face in receiving the health care they should expect in the richest nation on earth.

The second is <u>Joseph Holston - Color in Freedom - Jour-</u><u>ney Along the Underground Railroad</u>, with text by Barbara Stephanic. This is a wonderful art book of a series of paintings depicting the experience of those who traveled the underground railway to escape slavery. The many illustrations, beautifully reproduced in the book, are on display at the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts in Hagerstown through January 14th.

Survey of Catholic Doctrine

January 9th - February 12th, 2023

Have you ever wanted to explore your faith more deeply and understand more clearly the Trinity, Jesus as God's self revealed, the Holy Spirit and much more? We will study some of the major doctrines of the Catholic Church through the five week hybrid course Survey of Catholic Doctrine, a course sponsored through the Diocese of Wheeling Charleston and the University of Dayton Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation, it will run from January 9th to February 12th. There are no prerequisites, just bring your questions and a desire to learn about your faith. This course combines Zoom lectures/discussions once a week on Wednesday evenings from 7-9pm led by Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu with materials available online through the VLCFF website and meets the course requirement for catechetical certification for the diocese. New Testament

January 9th-February 12th, 2023

This course builds on the material learned in Introduction to Scripture and assumes a basic understanding of how Catholics read and interpret Scripture. We will explore the world behind the text of the New Testament, its history and culture, as well as examine how we today read and understand these texts in light of our own world and culture. We will look at how all four Gospels developed, study the letters of Paul, and examine the world of first century Christianity. This is a five-week hybrid course offered through the Diocese and the Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation of the University of Dayton. You will be able to work online taking guizzes and accessing material, as well as meet once a week via Zoom for class lecture and discussion with the course facilitator, Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu. The Zoom sessions will be held on Tuesday evenings at 7pm (a second session on Monday afternoon may be added if the response is large enough). The totals above include some generous end-of-year giving received 12/26/2022 through 12/31/2022 along with the weekend collection for 1/1/2023. Of note in this is that some of the contributions will be applied toward 2022 income and some will be applied toward 2023 income.

EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
