#### St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

This past Friday evening we celebrated the Stations of the Cross at St. Agnes with "Stations of the Cross: Overcoming Racism," originally written by Tom Faletti for St. Peter's parish in Washington, DC. and subsequently sponsored by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops in 2020. In the reflection on the thirteenth station, Jesus is taken down from the cross, it reads:

In order to claim Jesus' body and give him a proper burial, Joseph of Arimethea sacrificed his own comfort and safety and risked angering the powers of his day. We need to dismantle the structures of racist sin in our day, and we may need to risk our own comfort and safety to do so.

The U.S. Catholic bishops call us to change the structures of society. They say: "The roots of racism have extended deeply into the soil of our society. Racism can only end if we contend with the policies and institutional barriers that perpetuate and preserve the inequality - economic and social - that we still see around us." Working to change economic and social policies is not easy. Like Joseph of Arimethea, we will need courage. But we cannot remain silent We must engage with others in respectful conversations and take action to reform structures that perpetuate injustice.

We will be celebrating this same version of the Stations of the Cross again on Friday, March 24th, at 7:00pm. Another opportunity to enhance your Lenten journey.

#### Service, Justice & Peace Ministries

#### FEEDING THE HUNGRY & HOMELESS

Through the Spring and possibly beyond, we will be providing descriptions of our Service, Justice and Peace Ministries with an emphasis on **unmet needs**. We're hoping that some parishioners will be inspired by the Spirit to lend a hand. We need all the help we can get!

Three Wednesday evenings a month, four when there is a fifth Wednesday as is happening four times this year, parishioners prepare, deliver and serve 50 to 60 carry out meals for the hungry and homeless. The Youth always prepare the fourth Wednesday meal. They do most or all of the preparation on Sunday at the parish center, volunteers box and deliver the meals that fourth Wednesday. The first and second (and fifth) Wednesdays, parishioners (individuals, families or teams) prepare the meals at home or at the parish center. We continue to provide \$150 in cash cards for food purchases. The chefs usually deliver the meals themselves but sometimes need help.

Prior to covid parishioners may remember our Social Concerns weekends, the third weekend of every month. We collected funds to subsidize these food costs, and for other ministries as well. We'll soon be restarting our Service, Justice & Peace weekends but more on that later.

A SECOND NEED - DELIVERING YOUTH PREPARED MEALS ON THE FOURTH WEDNESDAY EVENING OF EACH MONTH The meal delivery is pretty simple: leave St. Agnes at 5 pm, usually for Mt. Zion Episcopal Church parish hall, 215 East Washington St., Charles Town; meal distribution starts at 5:30. With COVID restrictions reduced, food distribution is again indoors. This allows some of the recipients to eat there, and also allows for more interaction with the folks, which is a big deal. Generally, the dinner is within take-out containers, sometimes with an addition (dessert or fruit). We utilize recycled (donated) plastic grocery bags to put the meals together so they can be transported easily. Into the bag goes the meal(s) in the take-out container(s), a set of fork and knife (if needed) wrapped in a napkin, a bottle (or two) of water, and any addition (fruit or dessert) if needed.

The whole process takes about 30 minutes tops. Lately, as we have been moving back inside, we have more of an opportunity to interact, which was the whole point when we started this.





#### The Gospel at Home

#### This Week's Gospel: John 4:5-42

In this Sunday's Gospel, a Samaritan woman visiting the village well becomes the bearer of Jesus' Good News to her townspeople. Jesus chose a woman and a Samaritan to spread his message. He offers her living water, which brings a realization that Jesus is the Messiah and his new community will include Samaritans. We are first given living water at Baptism. Through our Baptism we become part of the community and given the grace to live as Jesus

#### Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Keep track for a day of how your family uses water. Make a chart where each can check off what they didshower, cook, drink, water the garden-and how the water made them feel—clean, happy, refreshed, relaxed. Use holy water to bless your family at the end of the day.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child is learning that God's presence in creation inspires delight and gratitude. God's presence in your child inspires him or her to follow Jesus. Ask your child about their experience of acting out the story slips to demonstrate how Jesus' followers act. Be sure to notice what delights your child and, as a family, talk about God's presence in these experiences.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Your child learned more about the Bible and dramatized the story of the woman at the well. Decide how your family will give living water to others by sharing your treasures, your time, or your talents with people in need. Ask your child to share the story of Mother Katharine Drexel with the family.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your youngster's class learned how important it is to speak up for what is right. Share examples of people who speak up for others. Talk about the woman Jesus met at the well, and what it meant that she was a Samaritan. How did she stand up for Jesus and for the message he gave her? Ask your young person to tell you about his or her scavenger hunt for believers and share the stories of how believers have helped you. Consider a discussion about Saint Patrick from the week's lesson.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Your young person's class learned how Dorothy Day witnessed Christ's love by helping people in her community. Just as the Samaritan woman was the first to hear directly from Jesus that he was the Messiah, people could learn a lot about Jesus from the way your family lives your Christian life. Talk together about what Jesus means to you and why you want to be his disciple. How can you bring living water to the people in your lives?

#### Pray Together

As an evening prayer, children often use the simple litany form of "God bless" followed by the name of a person the child wants God to watch over. Some evening before bed, gather together to create a litany of people who gave you living water by sponsoring you for Baptism or Confirmation, by teaching you about Jesus, by giving you good examples, or the like. Say a few words about the person and all can respond with a hearty "God bless (name)."



#### SAIA Did You Know

Pysanky comes from the Ukrainian word pysaty, which means "to write." The eggs are so named because their intricate designs of beeswax wax and special dyes are not painted but "written" onto the egg. Easter eggs are a pre-Christian practice. Before Christianity came to the Ukraine in 988, pagan Ukrainians heralded the coming of spring with their intricately-decorated and colorful pysanky. When the followers of Christ arrived in Ukraine and discovered this ancient practice, they did not ban the existence of the symbolic little eggs. They saw the beauty and meaning in them, and joyfully adopted the custom. They enriched the *pysanky* by incorporating Christian symbols and colors that represented their faith. The Ukrainians would make pysanky and bestow them as special gifts. Children and godchildren received pysanky, and unmarried maidens and eligible young men in the community exchanged the delicate treasures each spring. People gave the intricate eggs to their priests as a sign of admiration and thanks. They left pysanky in the cemetery on the grave sites of beloved family members who had died.

The custom became so deeply ingrained in the Catholic culture of Ukraine that no external force could obliterate it. When Stalin banned the making of *pysanky* in an attempt to stamp out Christianity, the undaunted Ukrainians responded by hiding in closets in the dead of night and secretly writing the eggs in the dim light of a sputtering candle.

The vibrant *pysanky* remind us of Christ's ultimate triumph over evil and death. This ancient symbol of the Resurrection is a good way to keep in mind just what Easter is about. In your Easter decorations this year, include pysanky, hand-painted in Ukraine. Colorful, delightful, and expressive, these eggs proclaim the mystery of the Resurrection wherever they are placed.




