Please Don't Fall Victim To Email and Texting Scams!

Lately we are hearing from far too many parishioners that they are receiving emails or text messages from someone posing as Fr. Andy or Fr. Mat. **If you ever receive an email or text from someone posing as St. Agnes staff asking for money, gift cards, etc., it's a scam.**

No one, not Fr Andy nor Fr Mat nor St. Agnes staff, will ever write to you personally asking for 'favors' or to reguest for you to make a purchase or send money. You can usually tell by looking closely at the email address who sent the message. Emails from St. Agnes always come from office@stagnesshepherdstown.org. Emails from Fr. Andy will be from aswitzer@stagnesshepherdstown.org or aswitzer@dwc.org. These scammers are very crafty and often make some very slight variation on the actual email address, so you really have to look very carefully.

If you receive an email similar to this, simply delete it and be aware that email scams, phishing, and more, are part of our digital world. To protect yourself, it's important that you learn how to recognize these scams.

New Hispanic Ministry Committee Hosts First Event

Stormwater Management Plans

Last year, the town acquired a grant from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) to pay for a "Shepherdstown Green Infrastructure Concept Plan" and contracted with Downstream Strategies. The town decided to concentrate this initial phase on two areas, one of which is our church property. One of the yards across Back Alley from the church property is the low point for the entire area on either side of the alley and floods in heavy rain events. Additionally, Shepherdstown is part of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed, so we have an opportunity here to improve the water quality downstream. The goal for our property is to enhance the stormwater management infrastructure St Agnes already has in place while being good stewards of the environment. On February 16, Downstream Strategies submitted the final concept plan.

St Agnes now has the opportunity to apply to CBF for grant money so that we can implement these upgrades. We are in the process of preparing a grant application with the assistance of Region 9 (The Eastern Panhandle Regional Planning and Development Council). The application deadline is this week.

In addition, through a different grant track CBF offers, another grant application is being prepared. St Agnes, in 2011, worked with a professional landscape architect on a design for our church property that, though it predates the Pope's Encyclical, is very much in keeping with *Laudato Sí*. This grant, should we receive it, would help St Agnes to bring more of this design to fruition.







Family Guide

March 10, 2024 4th Sunday of Lent

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: John 3:14-21

This Sunday's Gospel describes Jesus as the Son God sent into the world to reveal God's love. Those who believe in Jesus believe in the power of God's love as the light of their lives-a light that can turn darkness into light and troubles into joys.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K-1): This week, your child explored the Christian call to forgive others as one wants to be forgiven. This is expressed in the Lord's Prayer and in the Golden Rule. Ask your child to share the forgiveness stories he or she heard in class. Share stories about how your family members model forgiveness and are able to say, "I'm sorry." Is there anyone in the household who might need forgiveness today?

Good News (Grades 2-3): Your child learned about the importance of rules when they play with others. The class learned, too, about finding loving solutions to problems. Talk with your child about forgiveness. The class emphasized that Jesus is the Light that shows us the way. Talk about how Jesus is the Light for your family. Don't pass up the opportunity to discuss the Ten Commandments, which the class discussed this week. See how many of the Commandments your family remembers, then check how you did. Pray that the Holy Spirit will help you follow God's Commandments.

Venture (Grades 4-6): This week's class learned about the Eighth Commandment. Ask your youngster to tell you the story about the person who collects just about everything. Talk about reasons people are tempted to tell a lie. Discuss ways you can help one another be honest. Your young person also learned about the catechumenate. Ask how the catechumenate is important to many people's faith journeys. Pray that Jesus will be the Light on your family's faith journey.

Visions (Grades 7-9): This Sunday's Gospel says that people who love the light do what is true and good. The young people explored the words to John 3:16. Ask why people regard this verse as the central message of the entire Gospel. The young people also learned that doing the right thing often involves personal risk. Ask your son or daughter to tell you about Homeboy Industries and how helping the gangs in Los Angeles is the way some people show that they love the light. Your youngster also experienced a reconciliation prayer service in class. Lent is a good time to share forgiveness in the family by expressing sorrow for any times when you have hurt one another.

Pray Together

As a special devotion, try to have a family evening prayer each day this week. Use a favorite family prayer, pray in your own words, or say one decade of the Rosary. Set a definite time for this prayer. Remember that the prayer time does not need to be long or involved. The important part is praying together in the Light of Christ.



Spotlight on Ministry

MINISTRY OF THE ALTAR SERVER

Altar Server is one who assists in the liturgical celebration of our faith community in any of a variety of ways (i.e., Carrying the cross or candles, handling the Sacramentary, helping the priest and deacon, etc.).

The celebration of Mass is the center of the whole Christian life for the Church, both universal and local, as well as for each of the faithful individually. In it is found the high point both of the action by which God sanctifies the world in Christ and of the worship that the human race offers to the Father, adoring him through Christ, the Son of God, in the Holy Spirit.

The service of the **Altar Server** is extremely important. Being an **Altar Server** means serving God and his people. That is what makes serving worth doing, and worth doing well.

Altar servers must have a desire to participate in the liturgy and be trained to perform their function in a correct and orderly manner. As an **Altar Server** you have a special ministry in the Church. It is your privilege to assist the priest and deacon at the altar. This means that there is a certain way that is appropriate to behave. The primary role of the **Altar Server** is to assist the priest and deacon in the celebration of the liturgy, the Mass, and other public prayer. This is done through specific actions, by setting an example for the congregation by active conscious participation in the liturgy (hymns, responses, etc.), and by being alert.

We are always in need of ministers. Will you share your time and talent? *Thank you all for your service*. Please consider joining one of our ministries at St Agnes. Simple Acts to Save Our Planet

With Earth Day fast approaching on April 22nd, our thoughts turn to caring for our planet. Some excerpts from *Simple Acts to Save Our Planet—500 Ways to Make a Difference* by Michelle Neff:

- *Keep a record* of your car trips to see what's necessary. It's often hard to see where our wastefulness lies. Record a diary of your trips, such as to the grocery store and running other errands, and see if you spot a pattern. Perhaps you can combine errands or cut some out altogether.
- Invest in eco-friendly sponges. To go green in your home, use a *biodegradable sponge* made out of natural and sustainable materials. Some sponges contain dyes and plastic, which are not good for our waterways and oceans. Making your home eco-friendly is not hard at all and will greatly benefit our planet!
