

Dear Parishioners,

This past Monday, March 13, 2023, we celebrated 10 years of the papacy of Pope Francis. I still remember in the Vatican when he came out in St Peter's square and asked the people for a blessing. I immediately, like many others, realized that this man was a great gift for our church. I remember the media scrambling when he took the name Francis. They thought, since he is Jesuit, that maybe he was taking the name after St. Francis Xavier only to find out later that he took the name after St. Francis Assisi. And we would find out that, like St Francis Assisi, he would rebuild a church that needed reform after the church had seen so much abuse of power. I remember a mentor of mine saying to me as a priest only ordained three years to watch Pope Francis and pay attention to him and he would show me how to do pastoral leadership. It is still amazing when I think about it that one of the people who I have never even met has taught me the most about being a parish priest is Pope Francis. I can look in both the joys of ministry and their storms as I have paid attention to Pope Francis; he has always steered the ship in right direction. Pope Francis has modeled servant ministry from day one, getting on the bus with all the other cardinals, going to the front desk to pay his hotel bill like everyone else, and greeting people after Mass in a church in the Vatican like a parish priest. This Sunday as we hear the readings I cannot help, but think about Pope Francis in them. The pope reminds me of Samuel who called David in the field to leadership as again and again he looks to the periphery for direction for our church and world. I see in Ephesians how Pope Francis, from his Jesuit tradition, has applied the gift of discernment in his pastoral ministry. I see in the Gospel of John and the man born blind how he has given us the gift of accompaniment and journeying with people so that they can experience the healing love of Christ. And, like Jesus in the gospel, Pope Francis steers the ship of the church away from rigidity and self-righteousness, refusing the road of exclusion and always choosing the path of inclusion. I remember a Glenmary priest telling me he was preaching to a group of Pentecostal pastors in the south and he kept calling Pope Francis my Pope, and the Pentecostal pastors corrected him saying do not call him my Pope, he is our Pope as well. As we do our ecumenical events in Shepherdstown perhaps we should remind ourselves he is our Pope and not just the Pope for Christians but for the whole world. Pope Francis, as we celebrate Laetare Sunday, thank you for giving us in your papacy the vision, as you titled it best in your first apostolic exhortation, the joy of the gospel!

Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat is a musical with lyrics by Tim Rice and music by Andrew Lloyd Webber, based on the character of Joseph from the Bible's Book of Genesis. Joseph is the favorite son of Jacob, and to show the world he loves his son, Jacob buys Joseph a coat of many colors. His jealous brothers sell Joseph to a group of hairy Ishmaelites, who then sell Joseph to an Egyptian noble. Joseph eventually lands in prison where his ability to interpret dreams gets him an audience with Pharaoh. Solving Pharoah's dreams get Joseph a maximum promotion, becoming Egypt's second in command. When famine hits Canaan, Joseph's brothers travel to Egypt in search of food, and meet up with Joseph. Seeing that his brothers don't recognize Joseph, he tests them to see if they have changed their ways.

This upbeat, family-friendly musical stays true to the Biblical story. It originated as a school project in London, England in 1968. The first professional production was in London, in 1973, and the first production with the musical in it's current form was in 1974. In 1982 "Joseph" made its Broadway debut, and the show has been enjoyed by millions ever since.

Service, Justice & Peace Ministries

FEEDING THE HUNGRY & HOMELESS

Through the Spring and possibly beyond, we will be providing descriptions of our Service, Justice and Peace Ministries with an emphasis on **unmet needs**. We're hoping that some parishioners will be inspired by the Spirit to lend a hand. We need all the help we can get!

Three Wednesday evenings a month, four when there is a fifth Wednesday as is happening four times this year, parishioners prepare, deliver and serve 50 to 60 carry out meals for the hungry and homeless. The Youth always prepare the fourth Wednesday meal. They do most or all of the preparation on Sunday at the parish center, volunteers box and deliver the meals that fourth Wednesday. The first and second (and fifth) Wednesdays, parishioners (individuals, families or teams) prepare the meals at home or at the parish center. We continue to provide \$150 in cash cards for food purchases. The chefs usually deliver the meals themselves but sometimes need help.

Prior to covid parishioners may remember our Social Concerns weekends, the third weekend of every month. We collected funds to subsidize these food costs, and for other ministries as well. We'll soon be restarting our Service, Justice & Peace weekends but more on that later.

A SECOND NEED - DELIVERING YOUTH PREPARED MEALS ON THE FOURTH WEDNESDAY EVENING OF EACH MONTH The meal delivery is pretty simple: leave St. Agnes at 5 pm, usually for Mt. Zion Episcopal Church parish hall, 215 East Washington St., Charles Town; meal distribution starts at 5:30. With COVID restrictions reduced, food distribution is again indoors. This allows some of the recipients to eat there, and also allows for more interaction with the folks, which is a big deal. Generally, the dinner is within take-out containers, sometimes with an addition (dessert or fruit). We utilize recycled (donated) plastic grocery bags to put the meals together so they can be transported easily. Into the bag goes the meal(s) in the take-out container(s), a set of fork and knife (if needed) wrapped in a napkin, a bottle (or two) of water, and any addition (fruit or dessert) if needed.

The whole process takes about 30 minutes tops. Lately, as we have been moving back inside, we have more of an opportunity to interact, which was the whole point when we started this.







The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 9:1-41

Gospel Weeklies

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus opens the eyes of a man blind from birth. It is the man born blind who sees Jesus for who he really is. The man's neighbors, parents, and teachers have sight but are blind to who Jesus is. In many parishes, those preparing for Baptism receive the Creed this week, and many of this week's lessons help young people know the Creed.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Young children are proud of their ability to recognize shapes and objects and call them by name. Ask your child to name different colors and shapes in your house. Teaching them the names of the different flowers, birds, and animals around them is a concrete way to help children see the wonders of God's Creation.

Promise (Grades K-1): This week your child learned to appreciate the sense of sight. Ask your child to share with the family the story of the man who was born blind. Talk about what a gift it is to see the wonders of God's world. Consulter taking a walk around your neighborhood or area and notice all the things we can see and believe. Then talk about the many things we can't see, but we still believe, such as love.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Ask your child to show you the puppets he or she made in class. You may want to use the puppets to act out the Gospel story of the man born blind. Ask your child what a creed is. Talk together about what it means to believe and why it is important that we say the Creed at every Sunday Mass. Consider going outside to find signs of Spring like the story the class read this week.


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Venture (Grades 4-6): In class, your young person read a comic telling the story of the blind man whose sight was healed by Jesus. Have your youngster point out the part of the story that he or she found most comforting or challenging. Ask your young person to share tomething learned about either the Nicene or the Apostle's Creed with your family. As a family, discuss how your faith has grown with each of you, and how you hope your faith will keep growing. Consider a discussion about King David from the week's lesson.


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
VISIONS (Geades 7-9): The Gospel of the man born blind gave your young person's class an opportunity to learn what it means to really see. Ask your son or daughter to tell the whole family about Louie—a legally blind teenager who works to help other people see. Talk about all the different ways of "seeing." Although we often say, "Seeing is believing," talk together about how "believing is seeing." You might want to end your family chat by reciting the Apostles' Creed (found on the last page of your child's lesson). Talk about how David was chosen King of Israel.

Pray Together

Have each member of the family write a short prayer that is only 140 characters or less. The prayer should be about how important it is to really see or to ask God to help you overcome your blindness. Younger children will need some help with their prayers. After all the prayers are written, let each person share his or her prayer with the family. If members of your family use social media, you may want to share these prayers with your followers, too.

St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

In light of the 10th anniversary of the papacy of Pope Francis on March 13th of this year and the United Nations' International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination celebrated on March 21st each year since 1966, we share with you some reflections on the subject from Pope Francis.

In his remarks on the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination in 2021, Pope Francis likened racism "to a virus that quickly mutates and, instead of disappearing, goes into hiding, and lurks in waiting." In his encyclical, <u>Fratelli Tutti</u>, promulgated at the tomb of St. Francis of Assisi on the day before the Feast of St. Francis on October 3, 2020, he wrote: "A readiness to discard others finds expression in vicious attitudes that we thought long past, such as racism, which retreats underground only to keep reemerging. Instances of racism continue to shame us for they show that our supposed progress is not as real or definitive as we think."

In a papal general audience on June 3, 2020 with English speaking people after the killing of George Floyd in the United States, he said: "My friends, we cannot tolerate or turn a blind eye to racism or exclusion in any form and yet claim to defend the sacredness of every human life."

Pope Francis speaks for the Catholic Church that includes people of every race throughout our world, that believes that every person is created in the image and likeness of God.
