New Hispanic Ministry Committee Hosts First Event

If we think about it, our lives are a mystery. I am reminded of the lines from the Van Morrison song, "The Mystery," where he says "let go into the mystery." Really what is ahead and unfolding in our lives, we cannot see. Please Don't Fall Victim To Email and Texting Scams!

Lately we are hearing from far too many parishioners that they are receiving emails or text messages from someone posing as Fr. Andy or Fr. Mat. If you ever receive an email or text from someone posing as St. Agnes staff asking for money, gift cards, etc., it's a <u>SCAM</u>.

No one, not Fr. Andy nor Fr. Mat nor St. Agnes staff, will <u>EVER</u> write to you personally asking for 'favors' or to re-<u>quest for you to make a purchase or send money</u>. You can usually tell by looking closely at the email address who sent the message. Emails from St. Agnes always come from <u>office@stagnesshepherdstown.org</u>. Emails from Fr. Andy will be

from <u>aswitzer@stagnesshepherdstown.org</u> or <u>aswitzer@dwc.org</u>. These scammers are very crafty and often make some very slight variation on the actual email address, so you really have to look very carefully. If you receive an email similar to this, simply delete it and be aware that online scams, etc. are part of our digital world. To protect yourself, it's important that you learn how to recognize these scams.

Racial Justice Initiative News

This weekend we are adding to our Racial Justice library, "*Tell it with Pride: The 54th Massachusetts Regiment and Augustus Saint-Gaudens' Shaw Memorial.*" It is a celebration of the National Gallery of Art's exhibition highlighting the Augustus Saint-Gaudens memorial in honor of the 150th anniversary of the Civil War Battle of Fort Wagner (July, 18, 1863), where the first regiment of Black soldiers to serve in the Union Army distinguished itself by its valor. The book brings to life, with many photographs and stories, the lives of the brave men who risked their lives and freedom to help free their fellow people in bondage. The book includes a roster of the more than 1500 men who served in the regiment between its formation in march 1863 and its disbandment in April 1865.

The list notes for each individual, if known, his age, place of origin, profession at enlistment, rank, and ultimate fate as a survivor, died in battle, or missing in action. Some three quarters of the men who enlisted were not from Massachusetts, journeying to Boston from many different states, North and South, even a few from the Caribbean and South America. An amazing number came from Canada, putting at risk their own freedom to serve the cause of others' freedom. In the roster of the 54th there were also three from our area, one each from Martinsburg, Hagerstown, and Boonsboro. The publication is well worth a look. It puts faces on the amazing sacrifice made by those who served. You may also remember the movie, "Glory," that celebrated the Massachusetts 54th's heroics.

Spotlight on Ministry

PART 2: WHAT IS THE EASTER TRIDUUM?

The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us, the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

Holy Saturday is meant to be a quiet day, remembering the empty space that was present for the disciples of Jesus after his death and before his resurrection. They did not expect the resurrection and so were left in a place of grief.

After sundown on Holy Saturday, the Easter Vigil is celebrated. It is one of the longest of Catholic liturgies, involving several readings from scripture tracing God's care for humanity, the baptism and reception of new members into the Church, the celebration of the Eucharist, and a great many joy-filled songs. It was that night when Jesus rose from the dead. It is that great victory over sin and death that the community celebrates.

The community will then gather again on Easter Sunday to celebrate Mass and continue the joyous songs of celebration. Jesus Christ has risen! Humanity has been invited into that same path through death to life.

Simple Acts to Save Our Planet

Or get a little creative and try placing them under indoor plants to hold water. You could even save the containers and bring them back to the same restaurant next time you order food. You'll be saving the containers from ending up in the landfill, all while reusing them for another purpose. Every little bit counts!
- Support restaurants that serve locally grown food. There is quite a bit that happens before your food ends up on your plate, including heavy water and land use and lots of transportation between locations. By supporting locally grown food, you're helping local farmers and shortening the distance between the food and your table.

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

Family Guide March 24, 2024 Palm/Passion Sunday

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospels: Mark 11:1-10 and Mark 14:1-15:47

Palm Sunday celebrates Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and the start of Holy Week. The mysteries of Holy Week are focused on the Sacred Triduum— the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Holy Saturday celebration of the Easter Vigil. This Sunday, we proclaim two Gospels—Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and the entire story of the Passion and Death of Jesus according to Mark's Gospel.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K–1): In class this week, your child's class made Holy Week booklets to help them visualize and remember the events in Jesus' life that are celebrated this week. Talk with your child about each page in the booklet. If possible, take your child to one or more of the liturgies of Holy Week so that he or she can begin to experience these very important celebrations.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week, your child's class learned of all the events in the final days of Jesus' life. Ask your child to share with the family what the days of Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday celebrate. Talk together about what it means that Jesus suffered and died for you and for the whole world. Be sure to display the palm branches you received at Mass.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week, your youngster's class learned about the story and symbols of Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and

Good Friday. Discuss the suffering and Death of Jesus and why it is so important that Jesus' followers know the events of these important days. Your son or daughter learned that Jesus' Passover from death to life is similar to the passage of the Hebrew people from slavery to freedom. Ask your son or daughter to share the Passover booklet that he or she made in class. Be sure to participate in the Holy Week liturgies as a family.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Most of this week's class consisted of a play that dramatized the story of Jesus' Passion and Death on the Cross. Ask your son or daughter to describe the play and to share his or her reactions to participating in it. Review together the meaning of Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday. Plan your family's involvement in the liturgies of Holy Week. Develop a plan for also observing each of these important days in your home.

Pray Together

One of the elements of the Good Friday liturgy is the adoration of the cross. One day this week, gather around a crucifix. Pray together the prayer from the liturgy.

Leader: "Behold the wood of the Cross, on which hung the salvation of the world."

All respond: "Come let us adore." If possible, pass the crucifix from one family member to the next. Each family member can then gently kiss the crucifix. When all have adored the cross, repeat the prayer. Conclude by making a reverent Sign of the Cross.





Community Garden Starting Up


The Gardens, all kinds of them, have been with us forever. Some of the earliest stories read to us or that we learned to sing are about gardens and farms, i.e. The Garden of Eden and Old McDonald's Farm. Those memories come ripe to arouse our senses, the smell of a particular plant, the colors and positions of various plants, the feel of leaves and fruit, the taste of a favorite vegetable fresh from stalk, and the sound of autumn leaves as you walk in the garden; but more about that next week. This week is a good time to look at a different aspect of the garden, a hymn that was penned in 1912 by C. Austin Miles, a Methodist minister, I Come to the Garden Alone. The lyrics are truly mesmerizing; this song starts us on a journey to examine the sounds, or lack thereof, the inhabitants, the water and the light, and companionship with God. Several groups here at St Agnes are working to build a garden that will offer the opportunity for everyone to be the builder and maintainer of that space: a garden for all.

Our Lady of Ferguson

Some of you may have noticed an icon that appears above the Racial Justice Library in the narthex of St. Agnes. This is Our Lady of Ferguson, created by Mark Doox. We wanted to offer an explanation of why we hung a reproduction of this icon to illustrate our parish's commitment to racial justice.





Violence, simply known as Our Lady of Ferguson, is an icon of the Madonna and Child. The icon, which depicts the Virgin Mary as a Black Madonna, was created in 2015 by the iconographer Mark Doox (formerly Mark Dukes). It was commissioned by the Rev. Mark Francisco Bozzuti-Jones, an Episcopal priest at Trinity Church in Manhattan. Created after the shooting of Michael Brown in Ferguson, MO, the icon has been referenced as a symbol against gun violence, particularly towards members of the African-American community in the US.

The icon was painted in the Byzantine style using acrylic paint and collage techniques. Our Lady of Ferguson depicts the Virgin Mary as a Black Madonna, holding her hands up. Where her womb would be, there is a small black silhouette of the Child Jesus, with the Sacred Heart of Jesus, also with his hands and arms extended, in the crosshairs of a gun. The posture taken by both Jesus and Mary are a reference to "Hands up, don't shoot," a popular slogan associated with protesting police brutality after the Shooting of Michael Brown in Ferguson, MO. The position of the hands is also in the orans (one who is pleading) posture found in other Christian icons. The icon focuses on Marian intercession against police brutality and gun violence, particularly towards people of color. The icon received publicity after Father James Martin, an American Jesuit priest and author, shared a photograph of the icon on Facebook on June 9, 2016. In his post, Martin wrote "Our Lady prays for all who are targeted by gun violence: African-Americans, the poor and marginalized,

and police officers. All are her children. All are our broth-

ers and sisters. Let us ask Our Lady to pray for us."
