EPEC Domestic Violence Discussion

WHAT CAN YOU DO WHAT CAN OUR PARISH DO ABOUT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE?

"Its the couple's problem." "Violence inside the home is a private matter." "If things were bad enough, she (or he) would just leave." "I have to keep the relationship going; it is what is expected of me."

These are just some of the common reasons domestic violence is a societal problem that goes underreported and takes the lives of innocent women and children. Domestic violence impacts not just the intimate partner, but also children that may be a part of the family, the medical system through ER encounters, the school system, the judicial system. Domestic violence impacts all levels of society from those living in poverty to the very wealthy, from those with little education to those who are college educated; domestic violence has no boundaries.

We asked Chief Mike King of the Shepherdstown Police department for his take on domestic violence. Here is his response: "Domestic Violence is considered a call that requires a priority response from police, an all-out emergency! Domestic Violence requires resources from the courts, police, medical, counseling, shelters, and the list goes on. It also requires citizens to recognize the signs and intervene by reporting what they see and hear so that Domestic Violence does not take another life."

If you are able, please read the book, <u>No Visible Bruises</u>, authored by Rachel Louise Snyder, or read excerpts online. And, please plan to attend a discussion about domestic violence presented by the EPEC (Eastern Panhandle Empowerment Center) staff on: **Sunday, March 10**, **after the 10:30 Mass, at 11: 45, at the church**.

This past week I had the opportunity to speak to Derek Gallagher's history class. I was so impressed and learned so much with this young group and what Mr. Gallagher is doing. One of the things we were discussing is the power of words. Words are sacred; they can do incredible good or a lot of damage. I gave the students the lines of the saying "sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me." We discussed how this an untrue statement that violence and war often start with words. This is a problem especially today from texting, Facebook, an email we might send, etc. and even in political rhetoric. This Lent I believe all of us can grow on how we treat and use words. I quoted to the students this week a novel I read, The Book Thief. In it, one of the main characters who grew up in Nazi Germany saw the damage words can do. And by reading, I was inspired by good words and this quote, "I have loved words and I have hated words and I hope I have treated them right." This Sunday St Agnes will be hosting an ecumenical event through the Ministerial Association. At 4pm, presenter Ashley Horst will be helping us learn to dialogue and use words in our civility in a sacred way to build up and heal our community. May we try to make it part of our commitment to come to this Lenten gathering to help build up and renew the community around us.

Stormwater Management Plans

Last year, the town acquired a grant from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) to pay for a "Shepherdstown Green Infrastructure Concept Plan" and contracted with Downstream Strategies. The town decided to concentrate this initial phase on two areas, one of which is our church property. One of the yards across Back Alley from the church property is the low point for the entire area on either side of the alley and floods in heavy rain events. Additionally, Shepherdstown is part of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed, so we have an opportunity here to improve the water quality downstream. The goal for our property is to enhance the stormwater management infrastructure St Agnes already has in place while being good stewards of the environment. On February 16, Downstream Strategies submitted the final concept plan.

St Agnes now has the opportunity to apply to CBF for grant money so that we can implement these upgrades. We are in the process of preparing a grant application with the assistance of Region 9 (The Eastern Panhandle Regional Planning and Development Council). The application deadline is next week.

In addition, through a different grant track CBF offers, another grant application is being prepared. St Agnes, in 2011, worked with a professional landscape architect on a design for our church property that, though it predates the Pope's Encyclical, is very much in keeping with *Laudato Si*. This grant, should we receive it, would help St Agnes to bring more of this design to fruition.

The Synod Continues in the Diocese

Continuing on our journey as a Synodal Church, faithful from around the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston are asked to attend a gathering in their vicariate until March 7th. Each gathering will be a synodal listening session to address two questions posed by the General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, who met in Rome in October.

- Where have I seen or experienced successes—and distresses—within the Church's structure(s)/ organization/leadership/life that encourage or hinder the mission?
- How can the structures and organization of the Church help all the baptized to respond to the call to proclaim the Gospel and to live as a community of love and mercy in Christ?

The last session will be held March 7 at St. Michael Church in Wheeling, beginning at 6:30 p.m. and everyone is encouraged to attend.



The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospels: John 2:13-25

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus makes it clear that the real temple of God lies within us. His cleansing of the Temple in Jerusalem calls us all to cleanse ourselves. We have the days of Lent to make a special effort to become less selfish and more loving—to renew and deepen our covenant with God.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K-1): Jesus reminded the buyers and sellers that the Temple is his Father's house and a place of prayer. Concentrate this week on finding a time for family prayer—mealtime, bedtime, early morning. Be sure that you include in your prayers the needs of people you know or needs of people who are suffering in your community or around the world.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned about the Ten Commandments this week. Ask your child to share the commandments with the family. As a family, talk about actions that show you are keeping each commandment. Ask your child to share with the family the story, "We're the Tigers." Talk about how the family is keeping Lenten plans too, and discuss how each family member can live a more holy life.


Venture (Grades 4–6): This week's class centered on the Ten Commandments and the covenant God made with Moses on Mount Sinai. Talk together about how the commandments help your family live a good life by honoring God and others. The class had a special emphasis on the Fifth Commandment and how uncontrolled anger can lead to violence. How can family members help one another to deal with angry feelings so that they do not lead to violence? Have your young person tell the family about Saints Perpetua and Felicity.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Lent is a chance for every family to grow in faith and love. Your son or daughter learned that living out the Ten Commandments is one of the ways to do just that. Talk about the commandments, and share ways that your family can help one another live each of them. Talk about how the commandments are a covenant with God and how they helped to form God's Chosen People. Ask your young person to share the two stories about feeling angry and talk about how each member of the family deals with angry feelings.

Pray Together

When you complete your conversation about Sunday's Gospel lesson, sometime during the next week or so, attend one of the Lenten liturgies at your parish. Most parishes have either an evening Mass, reconciliation service, or Stations of the Cross in the evening during Lent. Be sure to talk together about the liturgy you attend together.

Volunteering: The church is always looking for volunteers. It is our way to demonstrate our faith in action! All volunteers are required to be VIRTUS trained as required by the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston. If you would like to volunteer for any parish ministry including with our youth, you must be VIRTUS trained. Forms are located in the church narthex and the parish center on how to complete this process. All parents are encouraged to be VIRTUS trained.





Dennis Schuelkens, Jr., V.E., ext. 270. You may also call the Diocese's Office of Safe Environment at 304.230.1504. In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious, or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.


