

Dear Parishioners,

As we come to the culmination of the liturgical year and begin the season of Advent, I sense a lot of enthusiasm and good energy at St Agnes. Please Don't Fall Victim To Email Scams!

Lately we are hearing from far too many parishioners that they are receiving emails or text messages from someone posing as Fr. Andy or Fr. Mat. If you ever receive an email from someone posing as St. Agnes staff asking for money, gift cards, etc., it's a scam.

No one, not Fr Andy nor Fr Mat nor St. Agnes staff, will ever write to you personally asking for 'favors' or to request that you to make a purchase or send money. You can usually tell by looking closely at the email address who sent the message. Emails from St. Agnes always come from <<*email>*>@stagnesshepherdstown.org. Emails from Fr. Andy will be

from aswitzer@stagnesshepherdstown.org or aswitzer@dwc.org. These scammers are very crafty and often make some very slight variation on the actual email address, so you really have to look very carefully. If you receive an email similar to this, simply delete it and be aware that email scams, phishing, and more, are part of our digital world. To protect yourself, it's important that you learn how to recognize these scams.

Historic Houses of Worship Tour December 26, 2022

After a three year hiatus due to Covid concerns, the Historic Houses of Worship (Church) Tour is returning this year to Shepherdstown. This tour was very well attended in the years leading up to the Covid shut-down, and many tour participants visited both the chapel and the church. Docents will be needed to guide people around the church, and at the chapel, to talk with small groups as they sit in the pews. Updating Our VIRTUS (Protecting Our Youth)

The diocese of Wheeling Charleston and St. Agnes Catholic Church value the safety of our youth. The church uses VIRTUS as a training for adults who work and interact with our youth. We are in the process of having all volunteers of the church VIRTUS trained to help protect children. VIRTUS training is all online and the training is straight forward, and you can complete it at your convenience and in the comfort of your home.

If you are already VIRTUS trained in the diocese, your VIRTUS training is still valid. We are asking people to log in and update anything necessary and electronically sign any documents you might need to sign. To update, all you need to do is log into your VIRTUS account and virtually sign the updated documents. If you have trouble logging into your VIRTUS account, please contact Bill at the office or at formation@stagnesshepherdstown.org. The parish will be audited annually to make sure our VIRTUS records are complete and up-to-date.

Over the next couple of weeks, Bill will be going through all of the VIRTUS accounts. You may receive an email regarding your VIRTUS account. You will be asked to log into your account and complete any necessary electronic document signatures. This would only be the Diocesan Safe Environment Policy Form and/or an updated Background Check Form. At no time would you need to pay for anything or need to enter any credit card or bank information. If you have any questions regarding an email, please contact the parish office prior to giving out personal information. The email will come from virtus.org.

If you are a volunteer or someone that wishes to be trained but have never had VIRTUS training, you can find instructions for VIRTUS training in the Narthex of the church or in the parish center. You can also reach out to Bill (contact info above) for help.







The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 23:35-43

For the Solemnity of Christ the King, the *Lectionary* chooses a short passage from Luke's account of Jesus' Passion. The Passion depicts Jesus without physical or military power, yet he is dangerous enough to be put to death. As his opponents tease and taunt him, Jesus shows his divine power in forgiving a criminal on a cross near him. This man recognizes his own wrongdoing and truly believes that Jesus can help him get to Heaven. By this action of faith, Jesus transforms the Cross from a place of death to a place of life and forgiveness.

Promise (Grades K-1): The Gospel lesson this week is about forgiveness. Your child learned that Jesus is a leader—a king—who loves and forgives. Ask your child to tell you the story of the good thief. The class also learned that there are times when everyone needs to forgive and to be forgiven. Ask your child to show you the chain and medallion he or she made in class, and to share the loving words with you.

for this Sunday shows that forgiveness is a cornerstone of Jesus' Kingdom. Children of this age can be deeply hurt by teasing. Ask your child to share Mari's story with you, and discuss whether your child would be able to forgive those who tease him or her as Mari did. Invite your child to tell you the Gospel story in his or her own words. Talk about ways your family can show forgiveness to one another.

SOLUTIONS:

Venture (Grades 4-6): This week's lesson focuses on forgiveness. Ask your young person to tell you how we can recognize the need for forgiveness, and how we know that forgiveness has been given. Remind one another of the ways you ask for forgiveness every time you go to Mass. Discuss times when you needed both words and actions to show sorrow or forgiveness within your family. Encourage your young person to tell you what he or she has learned about the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Make plans as a family to receive this Sacrament during Advent.

Visions (Grades 7-9): In class this week, your young person explored the human experience of suffering and forgiveness. Ask your youngster to share with the family what he or she learned about suffering and forgiveness in the world. Talk about how Jesus showed what kind of a king he is when he forgave the thief on the cross. Talk together about how easy or how hard it is for each of you to show love and forgiveness.

Pray Together

Every family experiences the need for forgiveness. Spend a few moments together sharing things for which each member of the family is sorry. Then ask God for forgiveness and ask one another for forgiveness as well. In your family prayer, remember all those who suffer injustice throughout the world. End by praying the Our Father together.

St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

In light of our coming celebration of Thanksgiving, here is some often neglected information in the recounting of that first celebration that is relevant to the pursuit of racial justice.

The immigrant Pilgrims of Plymouth that first Thanksgiving Day were celebrating their survival and first successful Fall harvest which had been accomplished with significant assistance from the native Wampanoag people, who had supplied food to eat, seed to plant, and instruction on local farming practices. The Plymouth settlement itself had been established on the site of an abandoned Wampanoag village, Patuxet, with ready made cleared fields, paths etc., the result of the "Great Dying" five years before the Pilgrims' arrival in which 90% of the Wampanoag had succumbed to the smallpox that had arrived with contact with previous English traders. The English viewed this as a blessing from God, clearing the way for them to take possession of lands in the New World from heathen "savages."

The Pilgrims had also been blessed with a Wampanoag translator and guide, Squanto, who was fluent in English - ironically the result of having been abducted as a child from Partuxet by an English trader, and subsequently enslaved in England, and then having found his way back years later.

On that first Thanksgiving, according to one contemporary Pilgrim diary account, there were in attendance 53 survivors of the original 102 men, women and children who had set sail from Europe, and some 90 Wampanoag. Most artistic representations of the event depict only a handful of Wampanoag present. The first Thanksgiving was a "big table" with food provided by both immigrant and native.

Unfortunately new immigrants to these shores, having previously self-identified by their countries of origin, soon began to identify themselves not as English, French etc., but as "European" or "white" vs. "Indian" or "red" with the gratitude owed to Native Americans largely forgotten.

We need to be sure we do not forget as we celebrate at our tables and the Table of the Lord. We are thankful to be called to the table of Christ, to which He invited all he encountered, and continues to do so with and through his disciples.
