Dear Parishioners,

We are in this period of discernment as a universal church before the upcoming meeting on the Synod in Rome October 2024. This is not idle time, but rather a time of open discussion in the local church—listening and prayerfully considering what came out of the report in October in the A Synodal Church in Mission Synthesis Report. You will see I have a provided link to this report below. I would like to point out one topic that is critically important, but possibly we could easily overlook. That is ecumenism. This is all about working for unity among the larger body of Christ represented in other denominations. Pope Francis made this intention central for the Synod by holding an ecumenical service at the beginning of the Synod. We in Shepherdstown work well together with the other churches, and I believe, in the diocese especially, we are prophetic in this call of working for Christian unity. I encourage you to try to participate in the ecumenical prayer opportunities we will be offering this Advent that are posted in the bulletin. Ecumenism starts with prayer in a world of war, division, and polarization; how important it is for us to come together in our diversity to pray for unity and work for peace.

One of the places in our church that ecumenism comes up is mixed marriages, whether married to a Christian, Jewish, Muslim, atheist, or agnostic. We live in a tradition that can honor and respect and learn from this diversity. I see this gift of diversity often in baptism

prep and First Communion. I always point out that as a church we don't proselytize which means force our faith on others. We also do not show triumphalism. Our liturgical rites make this clear. Even in the rites of Christian Initiation of Adults, we always affirm the body of Christ and church that people come from. I recently read a surprising statement by Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger he made when he was head of Congregation of Doctrine of the Faith in 1993 where he emphasizes how important ecumenical dialogue is on the topic of Eucharist. This topic is part of discussion and discernment this year, but I give you this statement from Joseph Ratzinger, who would become Pope Benedict XVI, to think and reflect upon because it reminds us that we honor and respect the sacraments of our protestant brothers and sisters. Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger in a letter, writing to Lutheran Bavarian Bishop Johannes Hanselmann, "I count among the most important results of the ecumenical dialogues the insight that the issue of the eucharist cannot be narrowed to the problem of validity." "Even a theology of succession, which holds in the Catholic and Orthodox church, need not in any way deny the salvation granting presence of the Lord in a Lutheran Lord's supper."

100% of the proceeds are used for the educational expenses of the girls in Kolofata. This year we have a match of \$1 for every \$2 we raise which enables us to do even more. Stormwater Management at St Agnes

It is no secret to anyone who has passed through town during a downpour that all of Shepherdstown has a stormwater management issue. The town has acquired a grant to pay for a "Shepherdstown Green Infrastructure Concept Plan" and have contracted with Downstream Strategies. They have decided to concentrate this initial phase on two areas, one of which is our church property. One of the yards across Back Alley from the church property is the low point for the entire area on either side of the alley and floods when there are heavy rains. Additionally, Shepherdstown is part of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed, so we have an opportunity here to improve the water quality downstream.

The goal for our property would be to enhance the stormwater management infrastructure St Agnes already has in place while being good stewards of the environment. A few of us met with Matt Pennington of Downstream Strategies in September to walk the property and toss around ideas. At the end of October, Matt presented his ideas for St Agnes to the town, the Chesapeake Bay Trust (who provided the grant money), a representative from the WV Department of Environmental Protection, and representatives of St Agnes. Of note is that there is much grant money available for these kinds of projects. We are in the process of digesting the information and will keep you posted.

Fr Mat's Kolofata Fundraising Dinner Q&A & Our First Winner

We have our first winner! We'll announce the names of all the winners on December 3, with the total combined amount of all the winning bids. As promised, we won't announce the exact amount of this week's bid but will say that it was more than \$175. That doesn't mean that all the remaining bids need to top this – but then again, if you want to win think long and hard about your bid!

Six, two-person dinner packages will go to the highest bidders. Closed bidding starts on November 18 and ends on December 3. Minimum bid is \$100 per "package." One "early bird" Dinner Package will be awarded on November 19 from the bids received by that date. The remaining bids are included in the bidding for the remaining five dinner packages awarded to the highest bidders on December 3.

How and where do I bid?

There is a wooden locked box for bids located on the table where the Potholder+ items are paid for. There are bidding forms in the pocket on the front of the box.

May I bid on more than one dinner package?

You may bid on as many dinner packages (up to 6) as you wish. Just indicate on the bid form that this is a bid on " 1^{st} dinner package," " 2^{nd} dinner package," etc.

May I increase my bid on a dinner package that I have already bid on?

Yes, you can increase your bid. Just note on the later bid you submit that it is an increased bid for the dinner package you previously bid on.

The date (February 4, 2024) and location (Parish Center) of the dinner are listed, but not the time. How come? Once the high bidders are determined, they and Fr. Mat will mutually agree on a time – afternoon or evening.

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46

This Sunday, we hear Jesus' great parable of judgment. The parable clearly states that all will be judged on the Works of Mercy described in it. We are called to build God's reign on Earth and to share in that reign forever. But to do so, we need to care for the least of God's children and provide food and drink, clothing and shelter, comfort and companionship in order to live full lives. The requirement of God's kingdom is love—love for God that is shown in the way we treat one another.


Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child learned about the Works of Mercy. Remember that children at this age learn best by imitating the actions of those around them. The more the members of your family perform acts of kindness and generosity, the more those habits are formed in your child. Talk about how your family celebration of Thanksgiving involved sharing with people in need.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week, your child learned that God judges us by how we show love to others, especially through the Works of Mercy. To help the children understand the Works of Mercy mentioned in the Gospel, they played a board game about doing the Works of Mercy. Have them explain the rules and play the game with your family. Talk about how to see Jesus in the people we meet.

Pray Together



St Agnes Racial Justice Initiative News

In the gospel reading from Matthew for this final Sunday of the Church year, Jesus tells us where he may be found and loved: "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me." In honesty and humility, we, as Catholics, need to acknowledge that, in regard to Black Catholic Americans and all Black Americans, the Church in America failed to live up to Jesus' words, supporting the institution of slavery well into the 19th century, and continuing segregationist and racially discriminatory practices well beyond that, with effects even to this day. The Church owned and sold slaves, and through their purchase and sale, at times separated Black husbands and wives from their spouses, Black fathers and mothers from their children, and Black sisters and brothers from each other. In spite of this many Black Catholics continued to be faithful to the Church, adhering ultimately to their faith in the Jesus who spoke the words cited above. Their enduring faith should inspire us all.

There is an enlightening video on this subject, entitled "Slavery, Catholic-family Separation, and the Catholic Church in the United States" sponsored by Georgetown University's Collaborative on Global Children's Issues available online at <u>https://bit.ly/45uZq2d</u>. It is part of Georgetown's own attempt to deal honestly and justly with its own slaveholding history.

Blessing of an Advent Wreath

The use of the Advent Wreath is a traditional practice which has found its place in the Church as well as in the home. The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent. When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

All make the Sign of the Cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Response (R/.) Who made heaven and earth.

Then the Scripture, Isaiah 9: (lines 1-2 and 5-6) or Isaiah 63 (lines 16-17 & 19) or Isaiah 64 (lines 2-7) is read:

Reader: The word of the Lord.

R/. Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says:

Lord our God,

we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples,

he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us,

he is the Savior of every nation.

Lord God,

let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation. May he come quickly and not delay. We ask this through Christ our Lord. R/. Amen. The blessing may conclude with a verse from "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel": O come, desire of nations, bind in

one the hearts of humankind; bid ev'ry sad division cease

and be thyself our Prince of peace.

Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

In order to have your cards by Christmas, we will need to have your orders in no later than December 10th.

What is the Purpose of VIRTUS Training and Why Is It Important?

The Diocese of Wheeling Charleston is requiring all volunteers to be VIRTUS trained. This is part of the Diocese's Safe Environment policy that St. Agnes is required to follow. All volunteers must be Virtus trained, even those who are not involved with the youth. We must be in compliance by the end of 2023. If you volunteer in any capacity at St Agnes, you must be Virtus trained.

VIRTUS training is designed to help adults recognize the signs that indicate a child might be suffering abuse. It also helps adults by offering key points to help children, who might confide in them, deal with potential situations. Finally, it helps adults know who to contact and what the next steps are if they suspect or discover a child is being abused. All this training is designed to help adults help children through a difficult situation.

Our Safe Environment Coordinator, Bill Donahue, can assist with verifying your training status and/or initiating your training. The training is 100% online. If technology is not your thing, he will be happy to help with that, too! For questions or concerns, contact Bill at 304-876-6436 or <u>formation@stagnesshepherdstown.org</u>. Please help us achieve full compliance. The real purpose of the training is to keep our children safe, and that really does matter!

To Report to Diocesan Authorities: In addition to civil authorities, the diocese encourages reporting to the appropriate church authorities. To report suspected cases of sexual abuse of children by personnel of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston to the Diocese, contact one of the following designees at 1.888.434.6237 or 304.233.0880: Mr. Bryan Minor, ext. 263; Mr. Tim Bishop, ext. 353; or Very Rev. Dennis Schuelkens, Jr., V.E., ext. 270. You may also call the Diocese's Office of Safe Environment at 304.230.1504. In addition to the methods listed above for reporting sexual abuse, the Diocese also has partnered with Navex Global to offer the EthicsPoint platform to report other, additional concerns, such as suspected financial, professional, and personal misconduct of a priest, deacon, religious, or lay employee of the Diocese or any Catholic parish or school in West Virginia. The EthicsPoint platform can be accessed via www.dwc.org, under "Accountability", then "Report Misconduct" or by calling 844.723.8381. EthicsPoint is a third-party reporting system that reports to civil authorities where applicable and Diocesan authorities, and the identity of the person reporting is protected.
