Dear Parishioners.

On Sunday, November 20, at 4pm, we hosted at St Agnes the Ecumenical Thanksgiving service. The celebration was standing room only. We had the young people from the Shepherdstown Middle School band and Shepherdstown Elementary School choir perform. It was a joyful, festive, and prayerful night; we had a lot of fun! I said at the beginning that the young people in the band were a witness to our community, country, and world. They had different instruments, but together they would make harmony. In a time when people can be so divided, they showed the beauty of unity and diversity. Our whole service was that of people from different convictions, beliefs, and faith backgrounds coming together to celebrate—everyone there created harmony. I thought it was really a call of the synod that St Agnes hosting this event "enlarged the space of our tent." How did it happen? Certainly, there were those that worked to do planning and preparation, and a big thanks to them for making it possible. The truth is though that I think the celebration surpassed our expectations. As we celebrate this season of Advent, it is a season of expectation. We hear an image in the gospel this Sunday of the Lord coming like a thief. I would suggest that, in our Thanksgiving Ecumenical service, like a thief the Holy Spirit stole the show and surpassed our greatest expectations. This Advent image in Isaiah of all the nations climbing to the Lord's Mountain in Jerusalem for a time of unity and peace, I believe we got a glimpse of that Advent hope during the Thanksgiving Ecumenical service of diversity coming together in harmony. This is a witness to us of John the Baptist's cry, "He must increase we must decrease." As the Baptist was talking about Jesus, may we be open to that Holy Spirit when she shows up like a thief. Lets celebrate and let her steal the show!

Updating Our VIRTUS (Protecting Our Youth)

The diocese of Wheeling Charleston and St. Agnes Catholic Church value the safety of our youth. The church uses VIRTUS as a training for adults who work and interact with our youth. We are in the process of having all volunteers of the church VIRTUS trained to help protect children. VIRTUS training is all online and the training is straight forward, and you can complete it at your convenience and in the comfort of your home.

If you are already VIRTUS trained in the diocese, your VIRTUS training is still valid. We are asking people to log in and update anything necessary and electronically sign any documents you might need to sign. To update, all you need to do is log into your VIRTUS account and virtually sign the updated documents. If you have trouble logging into your VIRTUS account, please contact Bill at the office or at formation@stagnesshepherdstown.org. The parish will be audited annually to make sure our VIRTUS records are complete and up-to-date.

Over the next couple of weeks, Bill will be going through all of the VIRTUS accounts. You may receive an email regarding your VIRTUS account. You will be asked to log into your account and complete any necessary electronic document signatures. This would only be the Diocesan Safe Environment Policy Form and/or an updated Background Check Form. At no time would you need to pay for anything or need to enter any credit card or bank information. If you have any questions regarding an email, please contact the parish office prior to giving out personal information. The email will come from virtus.org.

If you are a volunteer or someone that wishes to be trained but have never had VIRTUS training, you can find instructions for VIRTUS training in the Narthex of the church or in the parish center. You can also reach out to Bill (contact info above) for help.

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 24:37-44

The Church's three-year cycle of Lectionary readings begins again on the first Sunday of Advent. We start reading from Year A, which is organized around Matthew's Gospel. The prophet Isaiah's words are used prominently in Advent. They are read as the First Reading each week and are quoted by Matthew in the Gospels. We begin the new Church year by hearing Jesus speak of his coming in glory. He cautions us always to be ready for him and to live each day in the light of God.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child made a simple Advent calendar in class this week. Display the calendar and open one panel each Sunday leading up to Christmas. The class learned different ways to prepare for Christmas. Ask your child to share some of these ways. Help your child choose one or two things to do for Advent. Using the pictures as a guide, request that your child tell you the story, "The Video Game Problem." Discuss what choices Frank could have made so he could have spent time with his family.

Good News (Grades 2–3): In class this week, your child reviewed the Ten Commandments. Talk with him or her about how to live the Commandments. The class also performed a play to learn about the prophet Isaiah. The words of Isaiah are used during Advent and Christmas. Ask your child to tell you how Isaiah spoke for God. Talk about ways your family can be ready for the coming of Jesus at Christmas.

S O L U T I O N S Venture (Grades 4–6): At the beginning of this new Church year, look together at the liturgical year calendar in your young person's lesson booklet. Talk about the importance of following the life of Jesus throughout the year. Your youngster also learned about the prophet Isaiah. Have your child share Isaiah's vision with the family and discuss why peace is a necessary goal for everyone. In preparing for Christmas, plan things to do as a family. Use the Week 1 Calendar List in the lesson booklet to give you ideas for this coming week.

Visions (Grades 7–9): In class this week, the young people considered how they could make Jesus' birth meaningful during this Advent. As a family, brainstorm activities that will help prepare your family's hearts and home for Christmas. Make sure what you choose to do is realistic. Your youngster can share some of the ideas discussed in class. Use a large format calendar to record the activities your family completes together. Advent is also a reminder of Christ's Second Coming.

Pray Together

Plan to have a family Advent wreath. The wreath traditionally has three purple candles and one pink, but four, all-white candles will do. During the first week of Advent, light one candle each evening. During the second week, light two; during the third week, light three. If you have colored candles, the third week is for the pink candle. All four candles will be lit during the fourth week. Say a prayer that shows how you are excited for Jesus' coming. It can be as simple as: "Come, Lord Jesus, come."

The Advent Wreath

Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple, and one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over, and they are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

The use of the Advent Wreath is a traditional practice which has found its place in the Church as well as in the home. The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent.

When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

All make the Sign of the Cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord.
Response (R/.) Who made heaven and earth.

Then the Scripture, <u>Isaiah 9:</u> (lines 1-2 and 5-6) or <u>Isaiah</u> 63 (lines 16-17 & 19) or <u>Isaiah 64</u> (lines 2-7) is read:

Reader: **The word of the Lord.**

R/. Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says:

Lord our God,

we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation.

Lord God,

let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath.
May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation.
May he come quickly and not delay.
We ask this through Christ our Lord.
R/. Amen.

You can usually tell by looking closely at the email address who sent the message. Emails from St. Agnes always come from <<*email*>>@stagnesshepherdstown.org. Emails from Fr. Andy will be

from aswitzer@dwc.org. These scammers are very crafty and often make some very slight variation on the actual email address, so you really have to look very carefully. If you receive an email similar to this, simply delete it and be aware that email scams, phishing, and more, are part of our digital world. To protect yourself, it's important that you learn how to recognize these scams.


