Mass at St. Agnes

This past weekend we had 49 people present for the 5:30pm Mass and 59 individuals in attendance for the 10:30am Mass. These numbers include those who chose to sit outside for Mass as we continue to have a limit of 50 inside the church. There were 5 present for the recording of the Sunday video Mass, and, as far as we know, there were 126 who tuned into the video Mass.

Feeding the Hungry & Homeless

Our parishioners continue to provide carry-out meals three or four Wednesday evenings a month outside of Zion Episcopal Church in Charles Town. However it is a small group of volunteers. If there is anyone or any family or a couple of families that can help we would appreciate it. As predicted and feared, the numbers are increasing and in the last week or so there have been families with children. St Agnes provides the carry out boxes and plastic utensils and \$150 in cash cards to offset food costs. Chefs are asked to prepare 50 carry out meals, though that may increase to 60 meals if the need continues to increase. And we welcome and need donations to cover the cost of the cash cards. Please make checks payable to St. Agnes Church and on the memo line write "homeless meals."

The Social Concerns Committee recently purchased 80+ pairs of socks to distribute along with the meals. This is one of the greatest needs of the homeless. If you would like to donate NEW socks please drop them off at the parish center. We are also continuing to accept donations toward the purchase of tents.

The National Association of Pastoral Musicians has bestowed on our very own Music Director, Dr. Elaine Rendler-McQueeney, the very prestigious Jubilate Deo Award. This is what the association had to say about Elaine,

"The **Jubilate Deo Award** is given in recognition of a substantial contribution to the development of pastoral liturgy in the United States. Elaine Rendler-McQueeney is a nationally recognized musician, teacher, author, composer, pastoral liturgist and speaker. A native Philadelphian, she graduated from Immaculata University in Music Education and Studied organ under Dr. Alexander McCurdy while serving as organist at the Cathedral/Basilica of SS Peter and Paul. She earned a masters' and doctorate (DMA) in organ from The Catholic University of America under Conrad Bernier and Daniel Roth (San Sulpice). During that time, she also served in music ministry at the US Naval Academy Chapel in Annapolis, MD and St. Mary's Seminary, Catonsville, MD. Upon graduation, she accepted a position on the faculty of Georgetown University in Fine Arts and Campus Ministry. Currently she is a collegiate full professor of Music Theory at George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia. She is the founding director of the Georgetown Chorale in Washington, DC, a non-profit music organization who members offer community service through music throughout the D.C. area. Elaine is perhaps best known as the editor of *Today's Liturgy*, the quarterly journal for liturgy preparation from OCP. She has been writing the weekly columns and music suggestions in *Today's Liturgy* for more than 35 years, offering practical wisdom to generations of pastoral musicians.

Board chair Jeremy Helmes remarked: 'Elaine's lifelong contributions as an author, teacher, liturgical minister, and pastoral musician have profoundly shaped the musical worship of the Church. We give thanks for Elaine and celebrate this award with her.'"

What is the Season of Creation?

The Season of Creation is a monthlong prayerful observance that calls the planet's 2.2 billion Christians to pray and care for God's creation. It is becoming more prominent, and Catholic involvement is growing. It's not just about prayer, though. It is increasingly a call to action.

WHEN IS IT?

It begins on September 1 and ends on October 4, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology.

HOW DID IT BEGIN?

Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios I proclaimed September 1 a day of prayer for the environment in 1989. This day marks the beginning of the Eastern Orthodox church year.

In the late 80's and early 90's concern for the environment was increasing, including the development of the Earth Charter which was a central focus of the 1992 Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro which formed the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change.

The World Council of Churches extended the observance from a day to a season. Among the earliest observances were by a Lutheran church in Adelaide, Australia in 2000 and by the Catholic Church in the Philippines in 2003. Pope Francis added World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation to the Catholic calendar as a day of prayer in 2015, months after the publication of "*Laudato Si.*" Last year he officially invited Catholics to celebrate the full season.

Jubilee for the earth!

HOW CAN I/WE PARTICIPATE?

Here's a brief summary of their challenge:

Choose one daily action to repeat for 34 days for creation. They offer some suggestions. We have provided a list below from a Catholic parish.

Take the pledge on the website to commit to the action. Track your habit through the month. They'll even send you daily reminders!

Remember – this is a time for both prayer and action. In the midst of the covid 19 pandemic this is a great way to connect with all our brothers and sisters and with the ecumenical community throughout the world to protect and sustain our planet and all of creation.

History of Labor Day

Labor Day: What it Means

Labor Day, the first Monday in September, is a creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country.

Labor Day Legislation

The first governmental recognition came through municipal ordinances passed in 1885 and 1886. From these, a movement developed to secure state legislation. The first state bill was introduced into the New York legislature, but the first to become law was passed by Oregon on February 21, 1887. During 1887, four more states – Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York – created the Labor Day holiday by legislative enactment. By the end of the decade Connecticut, Nebraska, and Pennsylvania had followed suit. By 1894, 23 more states had adopted the holiday, and on June 28, 1894, Congress passed an act making the first Monday in September of each year a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories.

Founder of Labor Day

More than a century after the first Labor Day observance, there is still some doubt as to who first proposed the holiday for workers.

Some records show that Peter J. McGuire, general secretary of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners and a co-founder of the American Federation of Labor, was first in suggesting a day to honor those "who from rude nature have delved and carved all the grandeur we behold."

But Peter McGuire's place in Labor Day history has not gone unchallenged. Many believe that Matthew Maguire, a machinist, not Peter McGuire, founded the holiday. Recent research seems to support the contention that Matthew Maguire, later the secretary of Local 344 of the International Association of Machinists in Paterson, N.J., proposed the holiday in 1882 while serving as secretary of the Central Labor Union in New York. What is clear is that the Central Labor Union adopted a Labor Day proposal and appointed a committee to plan a demonstration and picnic.

The First Labor Day

The first Labor Day holiday was celebrated on Tuesday, September 5, 1882, in New York City, in accordance with the plans of the Central Labor Union. The Central Labor Union held its second Labor Day holiday just a year later, on September 5, 1883.

By 1894, 23 more states had adopted the holiday, and on June 28, 1894, President Grover Cleveland signed a law making the first Monday in September of each year a national holiday.

Election 2020

As stated previously, voting in elections is not only a civic duty but part of our Catholic beliefs. Due to safety concerns caused by the coronavirus, you may prefer to vote by mail. If you choose to vote by mail, you should request your ballot as far in advance of the election as possible. Following are instructions on how to do this.

Requesting an absentee ballot to vote by mail

To vote via mail, you must first request an absentee ballot. Below are three options:

1. Apply online

For West Virginia: <https://sos.wv.gov/elections/Pages/GoVoteWV.aspx> (full set of instructions)
or <https://sites.omniballot.us/54/absentee/app/home> (Absentee application)

For Maryland: <https://elections.maryland.gov/voting/absentee.html>

Notes:

- You must choose a reason for requesting an absentee ballot. In most cases choose “medical reasons/Covid.” Keep in mind, just being anxious about COVID is a sufficient reason. You do not have to be sick with COVID.
- A signature is required for online requests. To sign your name, you can use a digital pen, mouse, or pad.

2. Apply by mail

a) Download the **absentee application form** from your County Clerk/BOE website

Complete the form and return it via mail, fax, or email to your County Clerk’s office.

b) Pick up the form from St. Agnes (please call ahead of time) or the Shepherdstown public library. Both will fax or scan it and email it for you for free.

Call your County Clerk or Elections office and ask them to mail you the absentee ballot request form.
